Thanks! officials. Come again next race. We shall try to get some others to realize you and so give you a chance to see the fun!

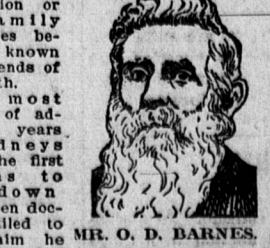
