A DEPARTMENT of the Fourth Regiment Canadian Artillery, under the command of Major Leigh, yesterday fired the King's birthday salute at Fort Edward.

J. A. McRAE, manager of the International Harvester Company, has returned from the Magdalen Islands, after a rough experience during the recent gale.

The funeral of the late John T. O'Brien, Fort Augustus, takes place this morning at eight o'clock from the Charlottetown Hospital to Fort Augustus church and cemetery.

Rev. A. D. STRELLING will preach at Marshfield this Saturday evening at 7 o'clock. Tomorrow, Sunday, Mr. Strelling will dispense Sacrament at 11 o'clock also and preach in the evening at 7 o'clock.

The hospitable doors of the ancient building, presided over by Jailer Hamill, were opened yesterday to admit Colin McDonald, convicted some time ago for violation of the Prohibition Act, and sentenced to three months in jail.

HYNDMAN & Co. received advice by telegram that the strike at the Intercolonial Coal Mines Westville, which has been on for three days, was ended, and that the mines resumed work this morning. Vessels will now be loaded promptly.

It is satisfactory to have the assurance of Hyndman & Co. that the schooner Lady Napier, reported in the press dispatches of the last few days as ashore at Richibucto, is quite safe at anchor in that harbor. Messrs Hyndman have received a telegram from Lloyd's representative at Richibucto to this effect.

As a result of the storm at Wood Islands a number of trees and fences were blown down and some very high tides caused more or less damage, fortunately not of a very serious nature. A correspondent, writing to The Guardian from that section reports that a steamer has been at anchor there for the last two or three days, riding out the storm in the lee of the breakwater. The crops at Wood Islands are said to be below the average, and the suggestion is given that if there were someone at Wood Islands to buy lambs, pork, poultry, cattle and horses it would be of great advantage to the people thereabouts. There are said to be ample supplies of that kind there.

Thanks now bringing 75 cents for good hogs, which, while a little lower than the prices which have been prevailing, is good when the quotation of \$5.75 per hundred live weight at Toronto, is considered. The Toronto price no doubt influences local prices, and there may be a tendency to let the price fall in an expected decline of prices to stampede the market and bring so many hogs to the City as to cause confusion. It is not thought that there is going to be anything like a fall in the present price. Good hogs will fetch the highest price, and those who have hogs which require to be properly finished should not be in a hurry to dispose of them before doing so. Holding them and presenting them in first class condition will result in more profit than disposing of them now in apprehension of falling prices.

A VERY enjoyable evening was spent Nov. 8th, at G. R. Garrett's, Murray Harbor South, when he and his good wife held a reception on the occasion of their golden wedding. There was a large gathering, but many more would have been present had it been fine and good travelling. A number came from Charlottetown, mostly relatives of Mr. and Mrs. Garrett. There were a great lot of very nice presents, a goodly number being gold coins. About seventy or seventy-five people took supper. After supper an address was read by Dr. J. T. Mellish, of Charlottetown, and several speeches, to all of which the host and hostess made very suitable replies. After some time spent in a social and agreeable way the company separated, wishing Mr. and Mrs. Garrett many happy returns.

The Sydney Record says:—When the little Prince sailed from the schooner Welcome, Capt. D. J. Sampson, drove ashore in Sunday afternoon's gale, and got stranded on the harbor shore off King's Head, the captain and crew could hardly have foreseen the pleasant reception which awaited them when they finally succeeded in reaching shore. The vessel which dragged her three anchors, grounded at a point near the rear of J. K. L. Ross's new residence, and when the predicament of the crew was discovered, Mr. Ross at once went to their aid and assisted them in landing, after which Capt. Sampson and his men were invited to the house and treated to the most generous hospitality. The Welcome hails from Georgetown, and brought a cargo of produce to North Sydney. It is likely that she will be pulled off.
