 tice of extending one-sided preferen-
 ces is not sound in its basis, that it
 does not have proper regard for the
 material welfare of Canada and that
 it does not make for a permanent
 system of Imperial economic unity.
 We believe profoundly that under
 such a policy as is here outlined this
 Dominion will become one of the fore-
 most and wealthiest nations on earth.
 And we are further convinced that
 this dream will not begin to be real-
 ized until we have a Conservative
 administration in power at Ottawa.
