IMPROVING BUOYS — The Marine Department is starting a new program of electrifying light-houses with small, wind-chargers and lighted buoys with battery power. These buoys carry four lights which rotate, so that when one light burns out, the next one comes on until the four lights are burnt out. This system gives a much longer lighting period requiring less attention and servicing.

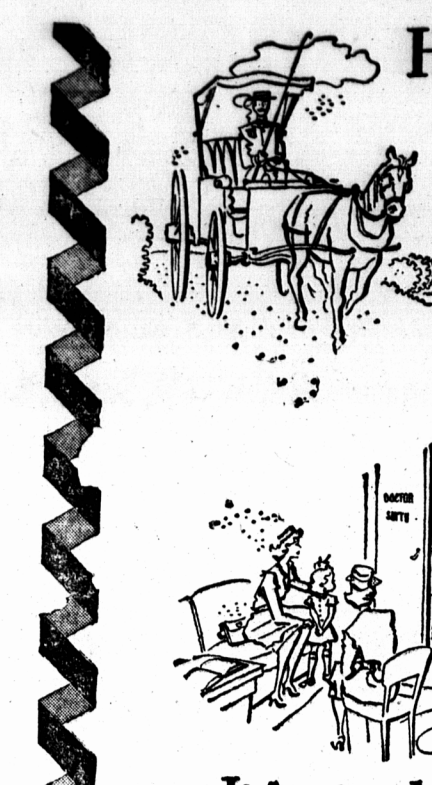
MISSISSIPPI PARTY — The "Know Mississippi Bette" train party, comprising some 200 visitors from the State of Mississippi who are scheduled to visit Charlottetown on July 20, will be guests of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau following their arrival at 1 p.m. and will be entertained by them at a luncheon at The Charlottetown. Later the visitors will be taken on a tour of points of interest on the island, the transportation being provided by local citizens. On their return they will have a private dinner at the Charlottetown, after which they will leave at 8.15 for Eorden and the mainland. The executive committee of the party are Messrs. Dennis Murphy, general chairman, Dr. F. J. Underwood, State Health Officer, S. Corley, State Commissioner of Agriculture, and W. F. Bond, State Commissioner of Public Welfare, all of Jackson, Miss. The party is touring Canada with a special exhibit car but it is not certain as yet whether this car will be taken across the Straits. In a recent letter to Premier Jones, Mr. Murphy expresses the hope that it will be possible to do so, as he would "like very much" for the people of Charlottetown to see this exhibit.

SUPREME COURT — The trial of Howard Court, charged with the recent assault opened at 11 o'clock yesterday morning before Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell and a petit jury. Attorney-General F. A. Large and J.O.C. Campbell represented the Crown with W. F. Brentley, K.C. and D.L. Matheson, K.C., appearing for the accused. The case for the Crown concluded at about 3 o'clock. Before the Court adjourned, three witnesses for the defence had been heard. The jury comprises Messrs. Peter MacEwen, foreman, Victoria; Arnett Shaw, Winsloe North; Lyman Tremere, Hampshire; Warfield Orr, New Glasgow; John MacRae, Cherry Valley; Cameron McPhee, Belfast; Daniel MacItye, Grand Tracadie; Lemuel Tomant, Churchville; Campbell McPherson, New Dominion; Leigh Good, Cornwall; Norman McLeod, Riverdale; and Alexander MacEchern, Long Creek. Upon the request of R.R. Bell, K.C., the Chief Justice, with the consent of the Attorney General, postponed the trial of Peter Jarvis Vesey, charged with murder, to Sept. 16 next. Mr. Bell in making his request said that owing to the strangeness of the case, he wished to have his client examined by competent psychiatrists and that an adjournment of the case for a few weeks would make such an examination, with the consent of the Attorney General, possible.

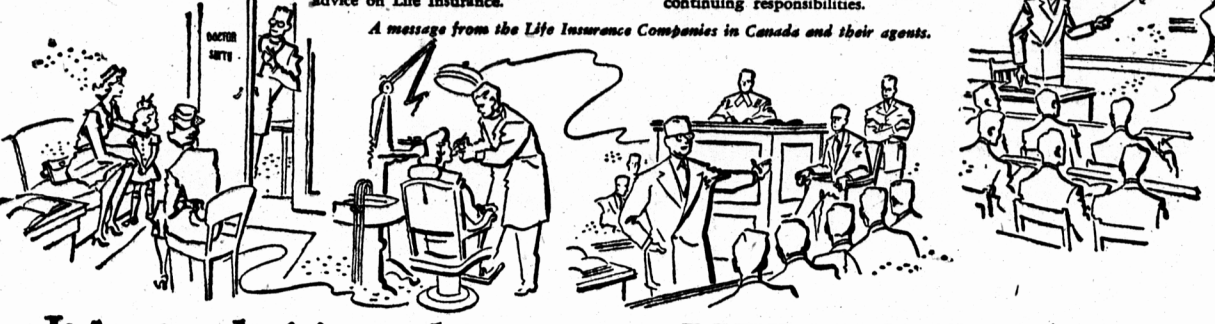

London Newspaper Lauds Premier King

LONDON, June 23 (CP)—The Evening Standard today devoted a column-long editorial to praise of Prime Minister Mackenzie King of Canada, paying tribute to "the man and to the nation which so repeatedly has given him its confidence". Headed "Canada marches" beneath a caption "he has been both architect and laborer," the editorial said: "Next week Canada celebrates her 80th birthday as a dominion. For exactly one-quarter of that time her prime minister has been Mr. Mackenzie King, in a political life that dates from 1900 through five imperial reigns he has served the people of Canada and of the British Commonwealth. In the whole history of free parliamentary elections, few can claim to have occupied so leading a position so long and so prominently. This is a tribute to the man and to the nation which has so repeatedly given him its confidence. In the course of his career Mr. King has seen many tyrannies and many personal dictatorships, enforced by the ruthless exercise of state power by secret police and propaganda, crumble into a loathsome ruin. He by and through no other medium than the freely-expressed consent of his countrymen has outlasted the dictators. His career is evidence both of the general excellence which has made him worthy of leadership and the strength and stability of the democratic system which chooses him as a leader. The life of Mr. King unites as an inseparable strand through the thread of Canada's 20th-century history. Perhaps his greatest achievement is the one least recognized by the outside world. Canada is a land of two peoples, one French, the other English speaking, between whom runs a line of social and economic discord. "Mr. King has broken that line. In 20 years of office as prime minister he has patiently and consistently striven to promote unity in Canada. When the supreme test of all his endeavors came in 1939 they gloriously proved themselves. It was a united people that he brought to Britain's side. "Internal unity and the strengthening through the progress of the empire have been two of Mr. King's dominant aims. The third has been to establish Canada as a world power exercising her influence for peaceful and constructive purposes."

Bank of Mexico In Market For Silver

MEXICO CITY, June 23 (AP)—The Bank of Mexico is known to have entered the silver market here on a large scale, avowedly to get ready for coining pesos this fall but at a time when the buying will support the sagging market. One mining firm here last week got an order for 2,000,000 ounces of silver and experts in the silver market said they understood that the bank of Mexico plans to buy all newly-mined silver for the immediate future. Present production is between 2,000,000 and 4,000,000 ounces monthly.
