**AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION**—The importance of agricultural education is set forth at length by Dean True of the Association of American Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations in the September number of The Station Record. He points out that the number of students taking a full four years' course in agriculture has increased during the past decade from 2,500 to 12,500. The number of white students taking a short and special course now aggregating about 11,000. Since 1910 the annual number of graduates in agriculture has increased from 708 to 1,385. The number of men on the staff of the experimental stations has increased from 750 to 1,600. Ten years ago there was scarcely any agricultural extension work performed outside of the work carried on by the Farmers' Institutes. To-day there are 1,500 men employed in this work. There are at present 700 positions in the U.S. Department of Agriculture for which graduates at the agricultural college is prerequisite, and doubtless there are many other positions in which graduates of agricultural colleges would be of advantage. As it is, the Department is unable to employ the men and give special training along agricultural lines. Moreover, the demand for trained men on the farms and in American pursuits allied to agriculture is depleting the faculties of the agricultural colleges. The call is how shall we meet the incessant demand for agricultural colleges? If this is true of the United States, it is also true that there is a great dearth of agriculture trained men in Canada, and it would be well for farmers' sons in P.E. Island who are living on farms to think this matter over very seriously. Is there any profession they can enter to-day which promises equal opportunities of service to their country and at the same time offers adequate remuneration for their services. A Long Course in agriculture will be held in Charlottetown this winter and a lot of our men should take advantage of this opportunity. The course opens the middle of November and it is hoped there will be a full attendance.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Fighting of a most desperate character is in progress in West Flanders, and north-western France. The Belgian army, supported by the Allies, is holding on stubbornly on the line of the River Yser, against desperate and determined attacks and thus far have succeeded in bringing to a halt the advance of the invaders along the coast. This announcement is made in a French official communication and is admitted in a report from German headquarters, which says fighting has been going on since Sunday in the vicinity of Aisepport, at the crossing of the river near the sea. A little further south the Allies are making an attempt to advance toward Lille for the relief of that city which has been in German hands for some time, and are also pushing north

and south of Arras. Attacks yesterday on the advances at Lille, where the Germans hold strong positions, were repulsed. Southward at the bend of the line the Germans continue to make furious but unavailing attempts to break the French line. In the east along the Meuse the Germans have essayed in vain to repulse the French troops who deputed along that territory in which bunched des Romains, now in the hands of the Germans, in an attempt to cut out that portion of the German army and thrust it towards St. Mihiel. The French claim detailed progress at various points along the front. Paris reports that the Allies have captured fifteen German machine guns, two of which a battery of German heavy artillery in the environs of St. Mihiel. Both sides are bringing reinforcements to the western front, where the one supreme struggle of the war is on. The Germans are not bringing new troops from the east, but are throwing every available man in Belgium in the firing line. They seem to have railroaded well in hand, although they must have been seriously damaged during battles of August and September. Troops are being transported over them. Dutch sources report that train after train of wounded are being taken back to Germany. In the fighting in open country where the men have not the protection of elaborate entrenchments, such as they have on the Aisne, the loss must be very heavy, especially where endeavours have been made to carry positions by assault. German and Russian reports agree that the situation in the east has not changed, although the armies are in close touch along the east Prussian frontier, across Poland and Galicia. In Galicia, however, the Austrians claim to be making progress in their campaign, having driven the Russian invaders out and have repulsed Russian attacks. The Russians on the other hand say they are making large numbers of prisoners. Heavy fighting is still on around Przemyel and Cupolas and forts surrounding the town are said by an Italian correspondent to have been destroyed by big Russian siege guns. While the forts have been mined and dismantled and magazines blown up the town itself, however, was not damaged. The same correspondent says the battle of Vistula, San and Dniester Rivers continues. There is a system of great entrenchments on the Russian side and the whole front is furnished with powerful guns which day and night hurl thousands of projectiles into the enemy's lines. Austrians and Germans, adds the correspondent, have been obliged to remain on the defensive but have repulsed great cavalry attacks to the west of Warsaw. Sarajevo, the Bosnian capital, according to a report from Nish, are now completely enveloped by Serbians. Determined efforts are being made to take the town before the conclusion of the trial of the alleged assassin of the Austrian heir, Archduke Francis Ferdinand, which started the war. In South Africa the rebellion of Col. Maritz is broken up. Italy has issued an official denial of the report that she occupied Avlona, the Adriatic port of Albania. News from Italy shows that the Italian people are growing more antagonistic to Austria because of their interference with the Italian fishing industry by Austrian mines and the necessity of suspending the service of many steamers because of the danger to her coasts extinguished as that they cannot be of use to the belligerent Powers. The situation in Belgium, on account of shortage of food, is growing more serious and efforts are being made by American officials to hurry relief especially to Brussels, where the need is greatest.

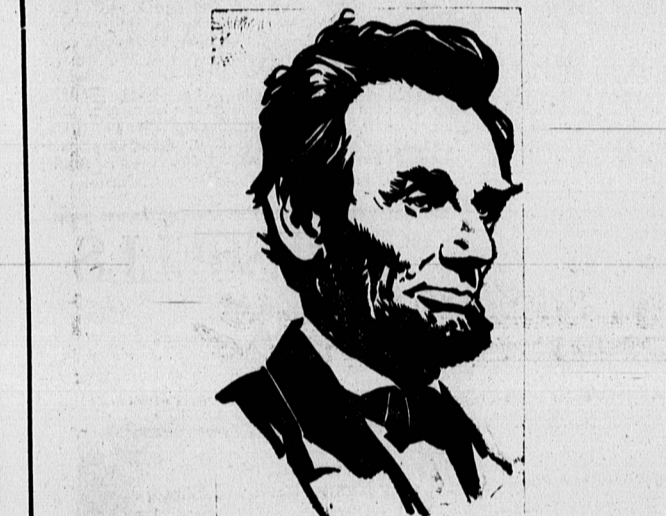
