MYSTERY SURROUNDS LOST FLIERS

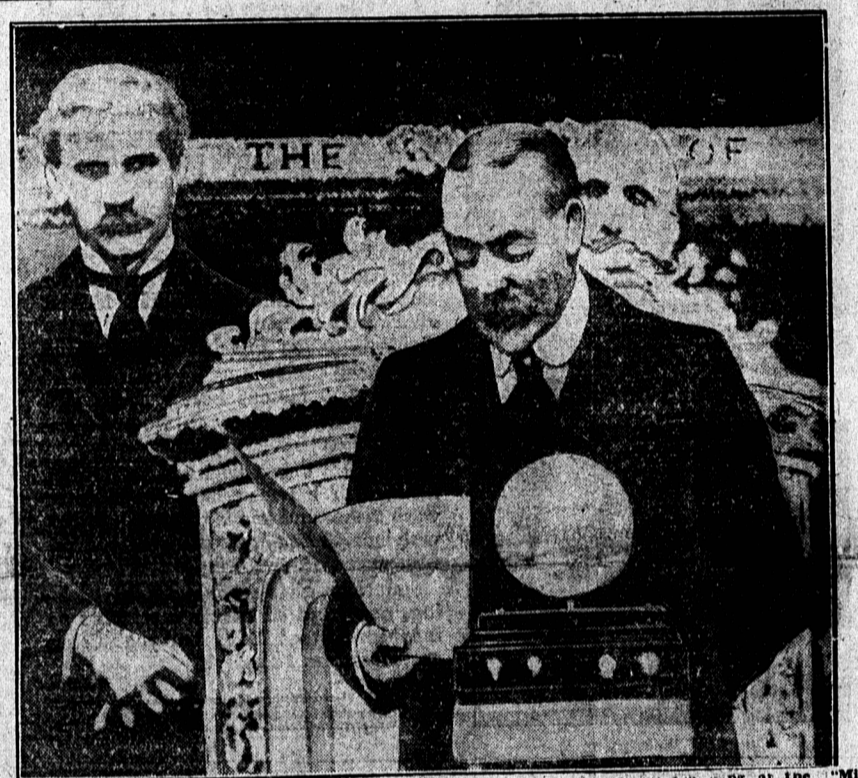
Left Alaska For North Cape Last November—Plane Found Near Coast of Siberia.

Says Producers Have A Right To Be Protected In Their Own Market.

BRANTFORD, Ont., Jan. 25.—I am not a free trader, nor do I think that free trade could be the practice in Canada today, declared Hon. W. D. Euler, Minister of the National Revenue, at a Liberal banquet here last night. Free trade is all right in the ordinary if other countries did not erect impassable tariff walls about them. I am not afraid to say and use that word, that in a country which is excluded from the markets of another country the tariff may legitimately be used in a reasonable way to protect the rights of the consumers and also for protecting the industries of that country, so that these industries may have a right to their own market. The occasion of Mr. Euler's address was a banquet in honor of the Ontario Ministers of the Federal Cabinet.

500,000 HEAD OF CATTLE CONFISCATED

STORM ON DIGBY NECK TAKES TOLL

Two Coastal Steamers Go Ashore With Loss of Life—Two Seamen Win Battle For Life.

DIGBY, N. S., Jan. 26.—Four men drowned and two coastal steamers stranded was the toll taken by a storm on Digby Neck last night. The dead are Capt. Kennedy, Captain Sinclair Baker and seamen Fred Hill and Charles Kennedy. Capt. Baker was dashed to pieces on the rocks when he attempted to swim ashore with a life line, after the steamer Grace Hankinson went ashore with the Ruby L. in tow from Liverpool, N. S., to St. John. Hill and Kennedy were swept overboard by waves. Two seamen who survived saved their lives by holding fast to the Hankinson's rigging as waves swept over the ship.

Will Do His Duty Towards England

Lord Irwin, Viceroy Of India Takes Full Responsibility for Statement Re Ultimate Dominion Status For India.

NEW DELHI, India, Jan. 25.—Viceroy Lord Irwin, speaking before the Legislative Assembly today took full responsibility for the statement he made on his return from Great Britain regarding ultimate Dominion status for India, a statement which caused a considerable flurry in British and Indian politics at the time. He said that his intention was to focus attention on three salient points.

(1)—That while no British Government could prejudice what it would recommend to Parliament after consideration of the Simon report it rested in unequivocal terms, that goal of British Policy toward India.
(2)—It emphasized Sir John Simon's assertion that the facts of the situation necessitated a constructive attempt to face the problem of the Indian States with every regard to treaties regulating their position toward the British Crown.
(3)—It intimated the intention of His Majesty's Government to convene a round table conference before it formulated any conclusions. (That statement stands as I made it) said Lord Irwin "and in the light of the appreciation which I formed of the principal elements with which we all have to deal and with full knowledge that weight must necessarily attach to the considered opinion of anyone holding my present office, I should have felt I failed in my duty to India and Great Britain if I had tendered any different advice to His Majesty's Govern-
