JOHN ANDREW THOMPSON

On the morning of May 3rd, a death occurred at Kensington which caused widespread sorrow when the angel of death claimed the spirit of John Andrew Thompson after an illness of some months. However, ill-health returned and in spite of the best medical skill and tender nursing, by his family, he gradually weakened until the end came on the above mentioned date.

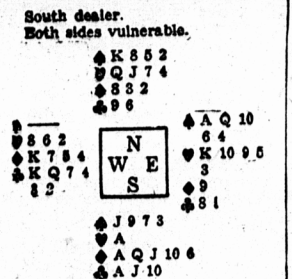


Contract Bridge

SUIT VS. NOTRUMP CONTRACTS

When you have four cards in your partner's major suit, it is usually wise to insist that the contract be played at that suit rather than notrump—but this is by no means an ironclad rule. Observe North's injudicious bidding in today's deal.



The bidding: South West North East 1 Pass 1 Pass 2 Pass 2 Pass 3NT Pass 4 Pass Pass

The four-spade contract and went down three tricks for a penalty of 800 points. He should have done a little better, but perhaps he was upset as well as annoyed when he found all five of the missing trumps in East's hand. The play at four spades, however, is not the issue—it is the bidding that we should bring under the microscope. North was entirely out of line in both his second and his third bid. It was permissible to answer the diamond opening with one heart, but when South then bid a spade, North surely should have been satisfied with a new contract—he should not have raised in the remote hope that South could make a game. Actually, however, this raise to two spades should have turned out well, because the three-notrump bid that South then made could have been fulfilled against any normal line of defense. At notrump, South would make two club tricks, four diamonds and the heart ace, then could maneuver East into conceding two more tricks in spades or hearts. Moreover, in view of North's highly optimistic raise to two spades, he might well have passed to three notrump, with the thought that a nine-trick contract might be easier to fulfill, for all of North's four spades.

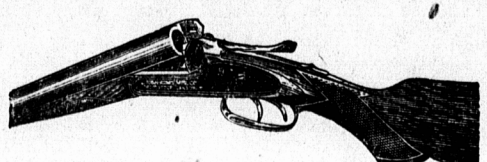
