## BAPTIST Y. P. U.

Officers Elected and Other Business Done.

FREDERICTON, Aug. 18.—At Thursday afternoon's session of the B. Y. P. U. Convention reports were received from F. W. Porter, of Fredericton, for the New Brunswick Western Association, and Rev. Mr. Quick, of Yarmouth, for the Nova Scotia Western Association.

It was agreed that the educational work conducted in the Christian culture courses be pursued with greater zeal during the year.

The following resolution was adopted: Resolved, that our unions be urgently advised and requested to find the proportionate amount their respective churches should contribute to our denominational benevolence, and that they make every effort that this amount be raised and forwarded through the treasurers of the churches to the treasurers of our funds at least quarterly.

The executive committee was authorized to co-operate with the representatives of the different parts of Canada in the arrangement of a programme for Young People's day at the first national Baptist Convention to be held at Winnipeg in July, 1900.

The report of the B. Y. P. U. editor, Rev. J. B. Morgan, whose duty it is to edit a union column in the Messenger and Visitor, was received and adopted.

are toothsome. For that matter, so, too, may be roast baby.

My thanks are due to Mr. J. P. Hood, manager of the GUARDIAN newspaper, published daily, weekly and semi-weekly, for his kindness in showing us about the town. The streets are neither paved nor macadamized. They are in the native soil, a red, sandy earth, hard and smooth in ordinary weather, but I suspect they are rather muddy in wet weather and disagreeably dusty in dry.

I judge from what I know of roads in certain parts in New Brunswick. I seemed quite like home, by the way, to see several of the streets open—for the laying of sewer pipes, I believe. Charlottetown is with the rest of the world in the public park movement, and already she has made some progress in it.

There is a fine shore drive, not yet completed with a grand harbor outlook. Midway upon it is Fort Edward, only a water battery, with old muzzle, loading guns no longer serviceable; but properly protected, modern ordnance at this point would render entrance into the harbor by a hostile

fleet almost impossible. There are many pretentious residences in this city and the suburbs are for miles away plentifully sprinkled with the summer houses of the wealthy and well-to-do.

As we left Charlottetown at noon, we had time merely for a cursory glance, and I have no doubt that a few weeks on the island might be abundantly and profitably occupied in seeing the sights.

It is not surprising that a summer trip to Halifax and Charlottetown on La Grande Duchesse is becoming so popular.—E.
