FLOUR MILL TO START.—The Guardian understands that a number of enterprising Charlottetown business men have recently closed a contract for the machinery necessary to erect a modern flour mill here with a capacity of 100 barrels per day. It is understood the site will be in the city and that it will give employment to a considerable number of men.

LAND SALES.—Mr. James Gillis-Strathcona, has purchased the timber rights of Mr. Daniel McKinnon, Trenton, N. S., of his property on Carleton Road, while Mr. Lauchlin McKinnon, Southampton, has purchased from Mr. Macpherson of Boston, his timber property on the same road. The latter had Mr. Jno. Alfred McDonald, surveying the place last Friday. Sergeant Wilson, of the old 105th has purchased the Miller's property at Southampton, including most of the farm implements, for the sum of \$5000 and has just settled on the place, having recently married.

THE CAR FERRY.—The car ferry steamer met better conditions on the route between Borden and Tormentine yesterday. On the previous day it took her four hours to go across and six hours and ten minutes returning. Yesterday she left Borden at 9.07 arriving at Tormentine at 10.55, leaving there at 11.22 and arriving at Borden at 1.45. She then left Borden at 2.29 arriving at Tormentine at 4.23 leaving again at 4.45 and reaching Borden at 6.37. The steamer brought 68 passengers, 41 for Charlottetown 19 for Summerside and eight for Borden. The train with mails and passengers from Borden arrived in Charlottetown at 9.20. There are about 115 cars of freight on the other side awaiting transport to the island.

Letter on The Forward Movement

To the Presbyterians in this Province.

On Monday next we take the last step in the first stage of the great "Forward Movement" for the extension of the Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.
