A SOCIAL EVENT AT CAPE TRAVERSE.

Rev. and Mrs. Jas. MacDougall and family of Cape Traverse were very kindly remembered by the members of the congregation on the beginning of the new year. On the evening of January 4th about sixty of the people of Cape Traverse and vicinity assembled at the Manse a prosperous and happy New Year. Major Clark, who is always conspicuous in promoting the welfare of the minister and congregation, in a few well chosen remarks called upon Dr. Dougherty and asked him to preside during the evening.

The "donation" consisted of a purse of \$120 including \$45 from the Canoe Cove, Argyle Shore, DeSable and Hampton sections of the congregation collected by Mrs. J. Inman and Miss Mary C. MacNevin of DeSable and has been further increased by an addition of \$50 from the Summerside section collected by Miss Bertha Ramsay and Masters G. C. and H. D. Boates making \$150 in all. Rev. Mr. MacDougall thanked those present for their pleasant surprise and the congregation for their handsome donation. It was altogether unmerited and wholly unexpected on his part. He appreciated this as the most valuable gift he had yet received from them, not only on account of its intrinsic value but because of the encouragement it brought, the unanimity of the congregation and the assurance that the tie between pastor and people continued to strengthen. His labors in the congregation although arduous at times were always pleasant because of the loyalty, sympathy, and hearty co-operation of the people. He reviewed the great events that had transpired since they had met on a similar occasion among which were the severe accidents that had happened to the doctor and himself which he trusted would not detract from their humble service but would greatly add to their personal appearance. In behalf of himself and family he wished them

all a happy New Year and hoped that their kind gift would be repaid to them in a hundred-fold.

TO SAVE PHELPS FROM EXECUTION.

BOSTON, Jan. 25—Governor Foss and the Executive Council listened for three hours today to arguments for and against the commutation of the death sentence against Silas N. Phelps, the Munroe Bridge murderer, then adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, when a vote will be taken. Warden Brydges of the Charlestown State Prison was asked to put off the execution until tomorrow, and agreed to do so. Attorney Davenport of Green field, who defended Phelps when the latter was tried for killing Deputy Sheriff Emmett, of Hastings, furnished the principal plea for the commutation of the sentence. He based his request on the assertion that a man named Bishop of North Adams, could throw new light on the matter for which the Deputy Sheriff was trying to arrest Phelps. The Attorney also said that he had additional evidence of which he told the council in executive session. He said he was not able to produce one witness wanted, and asked for a reprieve of from sixty to ninety days, that he might furnish the Executive with new facts, and also have the wife and children of Phelps to appear. Mrs. Phelps being now too ill to attend.
