HOW TO CARE FOR DRESSING-TABLE SILVER

Dressing table silver such as mirrors, brushes and combs should not be immersed in hot water. Clean them by wiping with a hot, damp rag and then polish. Silver that is used only occasionally should be kept in air-tight drawers, individually cased in tarnish resisting cloth.
