**SPECIAL EVANGELISTIC SERVICES AT CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH**

**TEMPERANCE ALLIANCE MEETING**

**Reference Made to Recent Prince County Jail Episode, But Discussion on Government Responsibility is Avoided.**

The annual meeting of the Temperance Alliance of Prince Edward Island took place yesterday in the Y. M. C. A. with the president Mr. Thomas Moyle, Bedeque, in the chair. The first session was held at 11 a. m. and the second at 1.30 p. m. Both were fairly well attended. The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. A. J. Reynolds, Bedeque. The secretary, Rev. J. M. McLeod, read the minutes of the last annual meeting which were adopted as read. The president in his report complained that at the plebiscite there was an evident lack of interest as

shown by the small vote polled and the unsatisfactory majority. He deplored what he described as the subtle propaganda of the brewers and distillers in the press and by other means. A number of recommendations were also embodied in the report of a committee subsequently appointed, which were unanimously adopted. The latter recommendation arose from the suggestion in the President's report that the minimum penalty be made greater than at present. The following nominating committee for the appointment of officers and executive were named: Rev. E. H. Ramsay, Rev. E. M. Aitken, George E. Brown. Following is the report of the nominating committee: President—Thomas Moyle. Hon. Presidents—Messrs. Boyer, Erace and Crosby. Vice Presidents—Kings County, S. M. Martin; Queens, G. F. Hutcheson; Prince, John Simpson. Executive—George Barbour, L. P. Tanton, Rev. H. D. Raymond, Dr. A. C. Vincent, Lucas R. Allan, A. S. McKay, Rev. J. P. Fraser, E. O. Barbour, Geo. Brown, New Glasgow, Rev. A. J. Reynolds, Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson, Rev. D. M. Sinclair, Rev. R. H. Stavert, Rev. E. M. Aitken, Rev. John Stirling, Rev. W. E. Aitken, F. J. Lockerby, D. M. McKay, E. B. McLaren, Hector Murchison, Dr. Ramsay, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd. Secretary—Rev. J. M. McLeod. Treasurer—W. T. Huggan. A communication was read from the W. C. T. U. requesting that in view of the lax prohibition enforcement in Charlottetown, all prohibition offenders appear before Magistrate Tweedy in the future. The communication drew considerable discussion. The opinion was expressed by Mr. George Brown, chairman of the Prohibition Commission, Chief Inspector Haywood and Mr. Geo. Barbour, chief preventive officer, that the enforcement is not lax. The latter stated that the last year has been the most successful in his ten years of experience. Mr. George Brown spoke with deep feeling against the anti-prohibition propaganda, especially that published by "unscrupulous representatives of the liquor control press." Inspector Haywood opposed the suggestion made in the communication from the W. C. T. U. because its adoption would mean loss of the support of the Charlottetown police. He further stated that the best information as a rule came from the bootleggers themselves. He added that the support of the W. C. T. U. is needed, but that any criticism to be found should be brought before the officials themselves. On motion of Hon. Peter Sinclair the communication was referred to a committee from the Temperance Alliance and the W. C. T. U. to report at the next session. Rev. Dr. Ramsay called the attention of the Alliance to Sec. 75 of the prohibition act which refers to all incorporated towns in the province and which reads as follows: "The duty of seeing that the provisions of this act are complied with, and of imposing the same and of prosecuting persons offending against such provisions, shall devolve upon the chief inspector, and the local inspectors appointed, pursuant to this Act. It shall be the duty of the council, and of every member of the council, and of the police committee and of the police, and of every police officer in every town or city to enforce the provisions of this Act, and to take such proceedings as may be necessary for the punishment of any offender thereunder." Several speakers stressed that part of the section which states the duty of the council and of the police in every town or city to enforce the provisions of the Act. Mr. L. R. Allan, M. L. A., Summerside, on speaking in this connection referred to the recent episode in the Prince County Jail. He stated that the jail had been in unsatisfactory condition when taken over by the present Government, as locks and windows were not in good repair. He maintained that two stills were in the jail at that time. The windows

**Moves Address**

Mr. John A. Campbell, 4th Kings, introducing the motion on the Draft Address referred to the recovery of His Majesty the King and to his speech at the Naval Conference. He referred also to the death of U. S. Chief Justice Taft, which will be deplored not only in the United States but by every Canadian, as well. Reference was also made to the late Hon. F. J. Nash, whose record as an outstanding journalist, orator will long be remembered by the people of this Province. The speaker also made fitting mention of the death recently of Mr. Bruce Stewart, and Senator Prowse.

In the matter of subsidy claims Mr. Campbell stated that we are at a disadvantage with the rest of Canada, having no manufacturing industries. We import many commodities from the other Provinces, but they do not buy from us in return and we must seek in the United States for our markets. The speaker believed the Department of Agriculture was doing everything possible but he was sorry to see so many vacant farms throughout the Province. The farms sold under the Soldiers Settlement Board should be reduced in price and sold to some of our young men. As it is they are only declining in value every year. Reference was made to the criticism of many people when the Department of Public Works did away with statute labor. However, as the years go by people will see that our roads are in better condition than ever before, and this can only be done by the power machines. Graveling the roads was also an important factor in improving conditions. Mr. Campbell declared.

**Mr. H. A. Darby**

Mr. H. A. Darby, 3rd Prince, who seconded the address, said that Divine Providence was indeed bountiful to this Province during the past season. The Five Power Naval Conference and the broadcasting of His Majesty's speech at the opening were epochs in the world's history. Mr. Darby supported the remarks of the mover with respect to the noted men whose deaths occurred during the year. He would add as well the name of the late Dr. S. R. Jenkins, who was a former member of this Legislature. Discussing the Government attitude towards our subsidy claims, Mr. Darby said that the Premier has presented a further claim in lieu of the Crown lands. He did not think the Premier had neglected any opportunity of presenting these claims and expressed the hope that the matter would be settled shortly, and that sufficient increase in our subsidy would be secured so that we need not resort to further taxation. liable standard maintained by breeders of this province was commented on by Mr. Darby. He regretted the present necessity of having to import carload after carload of horses. The Department of Agriculture, it is pleasing to note, is doing its utmost to remedy this condition. The dairy herd at Falconwood Farm was commended, as were the excellent results achieved by the Potato Growers Association and the Egg and Poultry Association. Co-operative selling is the keynote of progress among our farmers. If we could sell our dairy products co-operatively we would do still better in that line. Everything should be done that would encourage our young men to stay on the farm.

Mr. Darby referred with pleasure to the increased sale of foxes last year. The income from pelts and foxes was nearly \$4,000,000. The Silver Fox Show last year was an excellent thing. A good many of our farmers do not know what a really good fox looked like until they saw the exhibition at Charlottetown.

The Public Works Department, Mr. Darby declared, has for the first time been put on a real business-like foundation. He instanced road work, bridge repairs, etc. We are now looking for improvements in our winter roads and a start has been made in this direction. All this he said, shows the administrative ability of the Minister of Public Works.

Brine freezing of fish products and the unlimited market for these products was referred to. The remitting of the fishermen's gasoline tax was being appreciated. If more money were put into the fisheries the speaker believed that in a few years the output would be doubled.

Discussing Federal improvements, Mr. Darby referred to the new car ferry, the building of piers, repairing of breakwaters and widening of the railway gauge which are being carried out at the present time. He credited those improvements to the Liberal representatives in Parliament and to the friendly interest of the King Government.

The Government's attitude towards public health was commended. In the matter of education, unfortunately the Government had to appoint a commission to satisfy the teachers. Until the Commissions report is tabled it would be inadvisable to comment upon this subject.

Cries of "Question," greeted Mr. Darby's statement that Prohibition has been better enforced under the present Government than under any previous administration. It was enforcing the act as well as it could be enforced, he contended. He did not think there was any criticism coming to the Government in this connection.

**Mr. Stewart's Address**

The outstanding feature of yesterday's session was the speech of the leader of the Opposition in which such matters as provincial subsidy claims, agriculture, roads, fisheries, public health, education, and prohibition were fully reviewed. The Government's failure to co-operate with the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick governments in pressing for subsidy settlement, and the misleading reference to this matter in an interview given by Premier Saunders on his return from Ottawa last January, were scored, as was also the Government's failure in prohibition enforcement.

Mr. Stewart pointed out that the Speech from the Throne should have contained some indication of the Government's attitude with respect

to the implementation of the report of the Education Commission which is to be tabled during the present session.

What the people want to know is whether it is proposed to submit any legislation on this subject at the present session.

A more extended report of Mr. Stewart's speech will appear later.

**Premier Saunders**

Premier Saunders said it afforded him a great deal of pleasure to compliment the mover and second of the Reply. Their speeches could compare very favorably with anything that he had heretofore heard. The Premier made fitting reference to the death of Ex-President Taft, and concurred in what had been said with regard to the late Hon. F. J. Nash. He was a man who was courteous and dealt fairly with political opponents. Reference was also made to the late Dr. S. Jenkins, Mr. Bruce Stewart and Senator Prowse.

The Premier declared that the Guardian had unfairly accused him of saying, "I don't know," in reply to questions placed on the order paper. He never in his life in answer to any question that had been tabled said "I don't know." He could substantiate anything he had ever said on the Floor of the House or on any public platform. It was true that he had "made many statements that may have been somewhat remarkable" to his friends in Opposition, but he declared, in no instance had they been able to refute a single one of them.

Last year, when the Estimates were going through committee, the leader of the Opposition had asked for the names of parties in connection with some County Court appointments, and as he did not carry the names of these parties in his head he had replied that he did not know. But when any question was put on the order paper the information was given, and it was given "more spontaneously" than ever before. The reason was that the Government never had anything to conceal. If there was anything he knew that was suppressed he would not submit to it. Everything would be completely answered.

The Premier referred to a tax case in which he had successfully appealed for an assessment on a motor car. This little matter had been displayed with broad headlines in the Guardian, when as a matter of fact he never even knew that it was coming up in Court. He complained further that he had never yet seen in the Guardian any single commendation of this Government or any Liberal Government in Canada. The Guardian was always saying that things were being bungled. Premier King, "that great man," seems to have done not one single thing that appealed to the Guardian.

The King's restoration to health was referred to. The speaker believed that people throughout the world should strive to maintain peace while not setting up his opinion against that of experts he had always taken the view that if we want peace we must do away with all armies and navies. We should have an international tribunal to carry out the peaceful decrees of the world.

At 6 p. m. Premier Saunders adjourned the debate.

sure that Great Britain, United States and Japan will sign some sort

of a three power pact, which already has been discussed here quietly. It is true, but seriously, the French will not disapprove of this three power agreement in any way, because they believe it will be some sort of extension of the existing Pacific pact, but the important thing to them is that they will be permitted to go home with the right to build whatever fleet they require, with further efforts at actual limitation and reduction to be left to the League of Nations, which in French view is the proper functionary to undertake arms reduction anyway. This apparently will suit Italy, which will not sign any treaty not giving her theoretical parity with France. In other words as far as fleet figures are concerned it would appear that France and Italy are out of the conference, although a week or ten days may be required to complete telling of the story. Mr. Briand was said to have considered making a formal statement on the French viewpoint today, but he may await further advice from Andre Tardieu.

There will be a number of private conferences today and tomorrow, with a full meeting of the chief delegates tomorrow at which events of considerable importance may develop. A plenary session may be decided upon for late this week or early next week.

**Naval Experts Meet.**

The naval experts of the United States, Great Britain and France met at St. James Palace today and tackled the task of trying to find some contribution for solution of the grave crisis which exists in the disarmament conference, growing out of the French tonnage demands. It was expected that the entire day would be devoted to an analysis of the French discussions. United States Secretary of State Stimson and Senator Reed got together with Reijre Wakatsuki and Admiral Takarab for further discussion of the problems between the United States and Japan. A United States spokesman said after the meeting, that while the points of differences were narrowing it could not be said there was an agreement on any single point. It was indicated that the next move must come from the Japanese.

**France May Withdraw.**

PARIS, March 12—The possibility that France might withdraw her delegation at the five power naval conference in London was discussed today in semi official quarters. There was no disguising the fact that unofficial sources were irritated by the growing sentiment in Britain and the United States against the naval demands outlined by France, especially her plea for security agreements in return for reduction of the high French naval tonnage figures. French sources represent their experts as attempting to keep cool, but also as becoming exasperated since everyone is attempting to make France responsible for break down of the conference.

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
