Benjamin Carr of New London has recently completed an extended visit to friends in Charlottetown, Rustico Winsloe Road and Tryon North. Many of them he had not seen for forty years and the meeting was a mutual pleasure. He has now returned home, having thoroughly enjoyed his visit.

The coming summer promises to be the best Tourist season yet. The Island has yet had judging by the numerous enquiries received by The Tourist and 200,000 Club. Some are from leading men in Ontario and Quebec and many from persons in the United States who were present at some of the Rev. Edwin Smith's lectures.

Saturday John Connors an old man of ninety years who lives with John McAleer at 172 Queen Street was taken to the City Hospital in ambulance. Mr. Connors while coming down the back stairs slipped on the steps a few days ago, fracturing his hip. The old gentleman has suffered a great deal as the result of the injury.

The dairy and cold storage branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture has issued a circular covering the result of the cow testing association at New Glasgow in this Province for the month of January. Five herds were tested, consisting of 32 cows. The average was 258 lbs. milk 4.7 fat, 9.5 test. The high test individual milk yield was 650 lbs. test 3.2. The lowest was 105 with a 5.4 test.

The report of Mr. Crockill, The Legislative Librarian, for last year states that during that year 27 books were purchased for the Legislative Library, and 118 for the Dodd Library. By gifts the Legislative Library was enriched with 1,127 volumes and the Dodd Library with 21. There are now 10,526 books and pamphlets in the Legislative Library and 967 in the Dodd Library. The above accessions of the Government Library comprises 645 pamphlets and 408 public documents, 5 volumes of newspapers and 21 magazines. Contributions have been received as usual from the Governments of the different English speaking countries and from scientific and other societies. During the recess the work of clearing out and renovating the upper rooms was completed, adding Rooms 4, 5 and 6 suitably shelved and heated to the Library. Mr. Fraser the assistant Librarian is now assenting cataloguing and indexing the mass of material "discovered" during this renovation. The amount expended on books for the Dodd Library was \$208.47. These books were received from London and New York and in their selection the usual care has been exercised. The circulation for the ten months covered by this Report was 4,227 and of this number 348 books were issued to country readers. The number of registered borrowers was 1,277. The work of the Library is extending very rapidly.

After fully discussing the subject, the action of our legislators in prohibiting the running of automobiles on the public highways of this province was highly approved by your and our guests. The proposal to tax farmers' dogs was strongly condemned but the keeping of dogs by others than farmers or drovers was in the opinion of the meeting a matter to which the legislative pruning knife might be vigorously applied with beneficial results.
