MONTREAL, Jan. 10 —(CP)—A weakness developed on hog market during early livestock dealings today and prices eased slightly. Cattle division held steady despite a bearish trend on steers while other sections moved slowly at unchanged levels.  
 Receipts cattle 1,343; calves 634; sheep and lambs, 546; hogs 1,321. Good steers sold at \$3.75 with mediums from \$4.75 to \$5.50 and common kinds \$3.50 to \$4.75. Good butcher cows made \$4.25 to \$4.75 with mediums from \$3.50 to \$4 with common kinds around \$3. Canners and cutters went from \$2 to \$2.50 while heifers ranged from \$3 to \$5.50.  
 Good veal calves made \$10 with medium goods up to \$9.75 and fair to medium in mixed lots at \$9 to \$9.50. Common lights sold down to \$7 while drinkers ranged from \$5 to \$8. Grassers sold mostly at \$4.50.
