SUNSHINE AND BABIES

Out of doors in the fresh air and sunshine, is the place where the baby should spend a great part of his life. In order that he may grow and have a strong, healthy body, the baby needs fresh air and sunshine just as much as he needs food.

Not only is sunshine pleasant, but it is actually health giving, and the rays of the sun acting upon the body are health forces which prevent rickets.

The baby should have his sun-baths regularly each day. There is a right way to take sun baths and this way must be followed or harm will result. The same attention should be paid to this part of the baby's life as is to his feeding and bathing.

Sun-baths must be taken in front of the open window. It is essential that the window be open, as ordinary window-glass keeps out certain rays which are desirable. As the weather grows warmer, the sun baths are taken out of doors.

On the first day, the hands and feet are exposed to the sunshine for five minutes only, no longer. Next day, the time is ten minutes, and so five minutes are added each day until the bath is made to last for one hour.

As the time is lengthened, the surface of the body exposed to the sun is increased. On the second day, the legs below the knees are exposed; then the whole leg; after that, the abdomen and, lastly, the chest, front and back.

On the day each part is first exposed, the time of exposure of that part should be limited to five minutes, and the exposure of each part increased by five minutes a day until the whole body is given an hour's sun-bath daily.

There must be no hurry with regard to the area exposed or the time of exposure as this causes trouble. The gradual increase is the only safe way.

The sun-bath should not come just before or after a meal. When the weather is really hot, the sun-bath should be given before eleven in the morning or after three in the afternoon as it is not desirable to expose the baby to the mid-day sun during the excessive heat.

Not only do the sun's rays bring health to the baby, but the exposure of the body to the air—the air bath—is also of benefit to the child.

The ancients worshipped the sun as a god. We today should recognize the sun as a giver of health.

Presbytery

The Prince Edward Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in regular session in Hearts Hall on Tuesday, May 5th at 11 a. m., the Rev. A. E. Chapman, Chairman.

The Rev. Thomas A. Wilson, B. Sc., Cove Head, was unanimously elected Chairman of Presbytery for the ensuing year. Rev. W. E. Aitken, was elected Secretary, and Rev. J. M. MacLeod, Treasurer. The following were elected Conveners of Committees, Missionary and Maintenance Fund, Rev. J. R. Saint, Home Missions; Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, Foreign Missions; Rev. D. K. Ross, Boundaries; Rev. T. A. Wilson, Social Service and Evangelism; Rev. H. E. Campbell, Students; Rev. G. N. Somers, Property; Rev. Dr. Ramsay, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd and Mr. Henry Smith were appointed as representatives on the Settlement Committee.

Rev. T. A. Wilson presented the committees report on Church Worship and Ritual. It was suggested that there should be optional forms, simpler, shorter, and free from archaic phrases. Church worship should be marked by simplicity, directness and reality in expression. Presbytery received the report without discussion.

The Secretary, Rev. E. M. Aitken, submitted the Statistical report, as follows: The strength of our sessions remain about the same as last year, 317, a decrease of 3. The number of stewards or managers increased by 19, being 493. The number of families has increased 189, being 4714. Number of persons not connected with families increased 139, being 645. The total number under pastoral oversight is now 19,506, being an increase of 1,597. There was an increase in the number of deaths of 43, being 315. There was a decrease in the number received on profession of faith of 99, the number being 232. An increase by 18 of number received by certificate, a decrease in the number removed by death by 14, a decrease in number removed by certificate of 101, an increase in total membership of 169, the total being 7676. An increase in the number of Sunday School of one, total 98, total membership 5677, an increase of 99. Number of Young Peoples Societies 65, a decrease of two. Total membership, 1567, an increase of 8. Number of W. M. S., 107, a decrease of 3. Total membership 1171, an increase of 10.

The total value of Church buildings is \$563,350, an increase of \$7,150. Value of manes or parsonages \$12,000, an increase of \$100. Total value of all church property, \$738,780, an increase of \$19465. There is a decrease in insurance of \$43,837. An increase in the number of envelopes used for local support of 28, total being 2637. For M. & M. a decrease of 37, the number being 1629. Yearly canvas for local funds a decrease of 26, being 61 out of 193. For M. & M., a decrease of 22, being 62 out of 103. Amount raised for local Church purposes, \$52,504, a decrease of \$3,499. Raised for M. & M. \$30,692, an increase of \$2,584. Total for all purposes, \$166,153, an increase of \$300. Amount raised by Sunday Schools \$5,661, an increase of \$270. The past year tells its story of faithful labour and steady progress. At twelve noon, Rev. H. S. Bishop led the devotional period, speaking from Isaiah 40.
