THE NEW WINTER STEAMER.

It is learned that Mr. Duguid, the nautical expert brought from England to assist in preparing the design and plans of the new winter steamer, has completed his mission and is now on his way home-ward. Presumably the plans are now being made ready and this moves us to point out the great desirability that the new steamer shall possess the two prime requisites insisted upon by the local Commission here, namely that it shall have steam power equal to the exigencies imposed by the ice conditions, and a large freight carrying capacity. These are points that must be kept in mind and insisted upon to the last. The Stanley and Minto have failed to meet the requirements of the service mainly in these particulars. They needed double their present power and double their present cargo capacity.

We fear the Ottawa authorities may not be sufficiently impressed with the necessity for enlarged carrying capacity in the new steamer. The traffic to and from the Island is very large during the season of open navigation. Steamers are plying to and from Pictou, Point du Chene, Hawkesbury, Halifax, Boston, Newfoundland, the Magdalen Islands and St. Lawrence ports to the number of perhaps twenty in all, and a multitude of small sail vessels besides. Suddenly the winter shuts in and with no railway outlet, the Island traffic is limited to the winter steamers, whose carrying capacity is small and their trips intermittent at best, and rarely is the round trip made in a day. It is obvious that with two or three winter boats to do the work which occupies ten times that number of steamers and sailing vessels in summer, the cargo capacity is a matter of the most vital importance.

In order to prevent the possibility of a serious and fatal mistake in that regard and knowing Mr. Prefontaine's desire to meet the demands of the service and the reasonable expectations of own shippers as far as possible, we venture to suggest that the plans for the new steamer as now matured may be submitted to the local Commissioners here appointed by him some months ago and whose report is now in his possession. These gentlemen are well acquainted with the needs of the winter service, and will be found friendly, judicious and capable advisers, especially in regard to what the steamer should be as a freight carrier. It would clearly be a prudent part to consult with them and receive such suggestions as they might find proper to make before the plans are sent to England and a contract made for the construction of the new steamer. We sincerely hope and trust that this course will be taken.

Hon. Raymond Prefontaine took leave of his department temporarily on Tuesday, 21st and has gone for a trip covering several weeks in Europe.

It seems to be now settled that there will be no tariff changes at the coming session of Parliament. There will be two sessions in 1906, one beginning in January and the second in November next, the tariff revision being reserved for the November session. The fortunate Members and Senators will thus be enabled each to draw two indemnities of \$2500 within the space of little more than a year. This will not tend to reconcile the Canadian people to the salary grab.
