The Summer School of Science.

The meeting of the Summer School in Moncton grows in interest, each succeeding day being better than its predecessor. This is a beautiful place for astronomical study, the clear sky affording ample opportunities for stargazing. This year the school misses Mr Cameron of Yarmouth, who formerly conducted the astronomical observations, yet a worthy successor has been found in G U Hay of St John.

The first excursion of the session was taken on Tuesday to Hopewell Rocks and Hillsboro Plaster Quarries, two places that no visitor to south eastern New Brunswick should go away without seeing. These are of interest on account of their picturesqueness as well as from a scientific point of view.

Amongst the classes attracting a large number of students is the one conducted by J B Hall, Ph D, of Truro, in Education. To speak of the sciences of Education in any of these provinces twenty-five years ago would have provoked a smile of derision from the vast majority, and I fear there are some still who think that all the science that is needed is to know the subject matter of what you teach, and you will be able to teach it to others. If any memory serves me I think that I heard a college professor within the past year publicly speak in this strain. That, however, is not the idea of the students who attend the Summer School. They realize that in successful teaching more is necessary than a knowledge of the facts that the pupil is expected to acquire. Under the skillful direction of Mr Hall they are seeking to formulate some plan for future child-study. At the Summer School they aim in the direction in which they expect in the future to proceed in their teaching and study of teaching.

On Wednesday evening the subject of the Round Table Talk was "Amateur Photography for Naturalists and others" conducted by W A Hickman of Picton. The mechanism of the lens, shutter and camera were explained. Full instruction was given to the amateur in selecting his first camera. Also instruction in using the camera, developing, toning and finishing the picture. Two faces were emphasized. One was that if the amateur really wished to procure pictures that were pictures and not mere toys it would be useless for him to expect to do so with an outfit that cost less than \$25, if he could afford it it would be better to expend \$50 on his outfit. The other was that any person of ordinary intelligence by care and study could become a successful amateur in photography. The importance to the scientist of being able to take pictures of objects was forcibly impressed upon those present. As a result of this evening's talk on photography there will some members of the School, who will add to their scientific outfit a good photographing apparatus.
