Canadian Legion Asks Cooperation For Remembrance

The Canadian Legion B. E. S. L. in asking that November 11th be in future known as Remembrance Day had only one fear and that was that the day would deteriorate into a public holiday and the main object be lost sight of.

The Legion has therefore requested all Branches to take the initiative in assuring that the day be observed by some united Religious Service in memory of those who fell in the service of their country. The Legion also urges that in all places where monuments have been erected, and where Legion Branches do not exist that the Clergy and School teachers take the necessary steps to assure a Religious Service at 11 o'clock on Remembrance Day. There is one other duty we owe and that is to the disabled. By the wearing of a Poppy on Remembrance Day all can help the Legion raise money for the assistance of the disabled soldiers and dependents in need.

Where no Branch of the Legion exists School teachers are requested to arrange for a sale of Poppies on the day previous to Remembrance Day by the School pupils, so that all attending the Service may be enabled to wear the Poppy.

If each school district would take one hundred Poppies a great success would be achieved for the aid of the disabled soldiers. Small Poppies sell at ten cents and the larger Poppies at twenty five cents. They can be had by writing Mrs. G. E. Sherren, Provincial Secretary, Canadian Legion, P. O. Box 274 Charlottetown, Popy wreaths may also be purchased if desired. As the Legion must know the quantity of Poppies required, it would be appreciated if all teachers would order their requirements at once.

About each war monument in this Province on Remembrance Day let there be a Religious Service, with those attending wearing the Flower of Remembrance.

IN MEMORIAM

WILLIAM H. HOGAN

Death where is thy sting, Grave where is thy victory?

was exemplified in the passing of William H. Hogan of Hope River, on the 28th of September at the advanced age of 84 years. He had enjoyed robust health till within about ten days of his death when he was stricken very suddenly with paralysis and a general breakdown, resulting in his death. His surviving sons and daughter (Mrs. Austin Murphy) will always cherish the memory of a kind and loving father. The close neighbors and host of acquaintances throughout the Province will mourn the loss of a friend whose every word and action tended toward the uplift of those with whom he came in contact.

Mr. Hogan possessed the happy faculty of straight forward manly approach to strangers and thereby made many friends both at home and on trips abroad. In late years he had been spending the winters in Ottawa where his two sons Joseph and Douglas hold advanced positions in the Government Civil Service. He had travelled extensively in his native Province and knew P. E. Island and its people as comparatively few persons are privileged to know it. He has been an outstanding personality in his locality and in fact throughout the Province for the last sixty years. He always took an active interest in Government, law, religion and politics and everything that tended toward the welfare of the state. In politics he was a firm believer and most staunch supporter of principles of the Conservative party's political economy and administration of state affairs.

In Mr. Hogan's young days there were political giants in the land, men whose names will be immortal in the later chapters of Canadian History. Coles, Whelan, John A. Macdonald, Leonard Tilley, George Brown, Thos. D'Arcy McGee, etc, he communed with those men (figuratively and literally) being an avid reader of the news of the day, and being contemporary with such men, it is quite natural that he should develop a special interest in affairs of state.

He possessed a prodigious fund of humor and anecdote, and was a most interesting raconteur, embellishing his stories with all their natural details and delineations an attribute which always made him a welcome guest in every household. His nephew, Hon. Dr. W. J. McMillan Minister of Education was a daily attendant at his bedside during his illness. His wife (nee Mary A. Nolan) predeceased him some years.

He leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father one daughter, Mrs. Austin Murphy, Emerald P. E. I., five sons viz, Austin of Hope River, Everett of Saskatoon, Sask, and the triplets, James Aeneas of Saskatoon, Joseph and Douglas of Ottawa. His daughters Mary and Clara (Mrs. Dr. Fleming) predeceased him some years ago.

The funeral was held on Wednesday, Sept. 30th at St. Anne's Church Cemetery, Hope River, a solemn Mass of requiem was sung by the pastor Rev. W. V. MacDonaid. The procession of cars and carriages was large—a fitting tribute to the esteem in which the deceased was held by all neighbors. Among those present were Premier Stewart, Hon. Dr. W. J. P. Hopeful Of Agreement On Trade Treaty

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, Oct. 5. (Canadian Press Cable)—Strong efforts at settlement of the deadlock that has arisen between Canada and New Zealand over a new trade treaty, are being made by an unofficial intervener, Sir Newton Moore, Sir Newton, a native of Australia and former Premier of South Australia, has spent many years in England and is a former member of the British House of Commons.

Sir Newton came here from Canada, stopping off on his way to Australia. He had a discussion with Prime Minister G. W. Forbes on the question of trade relations with Canada, today.

Sir Newton said he had discussed the position with Prime Minister Bennett before leaving Canada, and he was hopeful of assisting towards some measure of agreement between the two countries.

MONTREAL, Oct. 4.—Sir William Stavert has been elected chairman of the Board of Directors of Algoma Consolidated Corp. and W. C. Franz has been appointed president of the corporation and its subsidiary, Lake Superior Corp.

He has been associated with the Lake Superior group for many years and in 1912 was president of Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills and Lake Superior Paper Co., both of which are now controlled by Abitibi Power and Paper Company.

Would Cancel War Debts

SCARBOROUGH, England, Oct. 5. (A.P.)—The Labor party conference today adopted a resolution urging that negotiations be opened immediately between the Young plan signatories and the United States with a view to cancellation of the war debts.

Arthur Henderson, new leader of the Labor Party, sponsored the resolution which declared that the consequences of the war debts and reparations policy have been disastrous to Europe and the world. The delegates also adopted a resolution urging that Great Britain submit proposals for "drastic and far-reaching reductions" in all fighting services at next year's disarmament conference, and another demanding public ownership of Great Britain's coal mines.

These three resolutions are regarded with keen interest, for they probably will form the platform on which the Labor opposition will go to the people if the expected general election is called.

"O. K. Colonel"

LONDON, Oct. 5.—(Canadian Press Cable)—The picture of a distinguished Bishop of the Church of England saying, "O. K. Colonel," to his Archbishop was evoked by Rt. Rev. Arthur Winnington-Ingram, the veteran Bishop of London, when he attended a celebration this afternoon in connection with the Princess Christian day nursery at Hammersmith.

The Bishop has just returned from Canada and this was his first public function since he came back. He cheerfully told the company he had seen thirty-two of his nephews and nieces in Canada. He made a gift of "twenty-five dollars" to the nursery and then apologized for using the word "dollars." But he had become so used to Canadian expressions that if he was not careful he would find himself saying to the Archbishop "O. K. Colonel," he added. It was ridiculous for people to say the world was overpopulated, the Bishop said. During his visit to Canada he had seen great stretches of unoccupied land.

"I have seen food standing idle, which nobody would buy," he added. "The food supply of the world today is so great it cannot all be eaten; and I have suggested some should be sent to poor starving China."
