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Miss Giles' Address To the W. C. T. U.

On Sunday afternoon at half-past three o'clock, Miss Giles, National Secretary for Young People's Work of the W. C. T. U., addressed a meeting in St. Paul's Parish Hall. Mrs. R. A. Pendleton presided, and after the scripture reading called upon Mrs. A. McNair to lead in prayer. Miss Jacqueline McDonald then favored the audience with a beautifully-rendered solo. Mrs. Pendleton then introduced the speaker, who gave a most inspiring address. In the course of her remarks, Miss Giles said: "The temperance people in Ontario, who had been much disappointed when their province decided for Government Control, were wonderfully cheered when they found that P. E. Island stood firm in the struggle for Prohibition. With reference to the effectiveness of the O. T. A. the speaker stated that in their hospital at home before this act came into force they always had two or three patients in the D. T. section, but after the O. T. A. came into force there were no patients with this affliction. Christ was a preacher, a teacher and a healer; when on earth. These three professions have been especially honoured, and it is pitiful when we see how some of the members of these professions are lowering their ideals along temperance lines. The respectability which it gives to drinking is one of the hideous features of Government control. In one place in N. B., every third person who went into a liquor store was a woman; and the majority of those who go in for liquor are under 30 years of age, so that a new generation of drunkards is being raised up. Ottawa gets about \$15,000,000.00 per year from brewers and distillers' licenses and excise duties. In Ontario 6 new licenses for brewers and distillers have been issued; among these is one for Timmins in the north, and one for Welland. From June to January, \$39,000,000 was spent in the liquor stores, which does not look as if the traffic is being controlled. Miss Giles also spoke of the Loyal Temperance Legion work, and explained how this is being carried on in other places. At the close of the address, a very hearty vote of thanks was moved by Mrs. McNair for the earnest words of the speaker. A very beautiful solo was then rendered by Mrs. Leigh Warren; Miss Jean Fraser acted as accompanist for both these solos. The meeting was closed with prayer by Miss Giles.

CARE OF THE CHICKS ON RANGE

(Experimental Farms Note.) The simpler the methods of feeding and caring for the chicks that can be adopted the better. Feeding tests at the Central Experimental Farm have shown equally as good results from hopper feeding as when the chicks were fed at regular intervals, five or six times a day. When the nursery period is past and the chicks are old enough to go without heat they should be given roosts and as soon as they become used to them should be put on range. On range a light sandy soil is best. If a field of alfalfa is available on the one hand and a corn field on the other the conditions are ideal. Do not overcrowd; use airy, well ventilated houses, a mere shelter—a roof with walls covered with netting we have found excellent. Shift the houses and feed hoppers frequently so that the ground where the chicks spend most of their time does not become contaminated. Keep a supply of pure water, hoppers of growing mash, crimped oats, grit and oyster shell before the flock at all times. Give a full feed of grain in the evening; this is fed either by hand or kept in hoppers which can be opened for a while in the evening and closed through the day. Chicks kept as described will be reared under ideal conditions with the minimum amount of labour.

CAPITOL AUDIENCES REACT TO THRILLS AND COMEDY

"Hot Heels," the gay photoplay which opened at the Capitol Theatre yesterday, with Glenn Tryon starring, might be termed a doubly entertaining film. It merits classification as either a sparkling, effervescent comedy of youth, or as a thrilling, stirring drama of back-stage and the race track. Under either classification it is outstanding; under both classifications it is a rare achievement in the art of entertainment. You'll laugh until you are weak at the delicious comedy and you'll thrill until your heart stands still at the terrific suspense and the amazing Steeplechase which, for sheer splendor of treatment, gives other directors a mark at which to aim. To William Craft goes the credit for the story and the direction; while Glenn Tryon makes a more decided bid for the comedy crown than ever and must by now be just about ready for the title of King of Comedy. And there is no better foil for his comedy than Patsy Ruth Miller, who plays opposite him or the third successive time. She is exceptionally pretty in this and demonstrates her talent at every opportunity. The horse used in the picture is a marvelous steed, and should be mentioned. Such a jumper, such a flyer as this! Gretel Yoltz is splendid as the smart-cracking chorus girl, and Lloyd Whitlock makes a peculiarly lustrous villain. Tod Sloan and James Bradbury, Sr., are capable trouper. Extra laughs are supplied by "Kitchen Talent," a snappy two part comedy.

Saskatchewan has appointed a commission to study the generation of electricity at central plants and water power sites and its distribution throughout the province.
