## Bumper Crowd Sees Yankees Take Lead

BALTIMORE, May 16—War Admiral, Samuel Riddle's great little son of Man o' War, today ranked among the small circle of thoroughbreds who have won the two outstanding United States turf classics—the Kentucky Derby and the Preakness.

The Admiral thrust back the game stretch challenge of J. H. Loveheim's Pompoon to win the \$50,000 Preakness here Saturday, but his decision was not so decisive as that scored over the same challenger in the Derby a week previous.

More than 40,000 spectators the two horses came to the finish line of the 1 3/16 mile Preakness test separated by a head to furnish one of the most exciting climaxes in the 47 years of the Pimlico classic.

**War Admiral** had no such easy time as he did in the Derby, in which he beat Pompoon by 1 1/2 lengths. He was driving all through the Preakness stretch but by running the distance in 1:58 2/5 he strengthened his claim to America's three-year-old championship.

The track was a trifle slow from rains yet the time was only 1-58 seconds, slower than the Preakness record hung up by High Check three year ago.

**War Admiral** was the shortest priced winner in the history of the stake. A \$2 win ticket returned only \$2.70. He paid \$2.30 to place and \$2.40 to show. Pompoon returned \$2.90 and \$2.70 to place and \$2.90 respectively. Flying Scot, one of the outsiders in the wagering that favored little but the first two horses, paid 2 to 1 to show.

The victory netted owner Riddle \$45,000 and ran War Admiral's earnings for the year to \$106,600. He and other horses have shared the Derby-Preakness double. They were Sir Barton, star of the now disbanded Mottled Stable of Commander J. K. L. Ross, Gallant Fox, Burgoon King, Omaha and Bold Venture. If so why was Benny Blinn's entry barred. It is only fair to state that Blinn but how many times in ring history has a fighter taken defeat and later conquered his one time master. Certainly there is room for argument and it leaves many of us at present dubious as to who is the Heavy Weight Champion, although Evans chased Leslie into pugilistic oblivion for the time being. Again in the Light-Heavy class Blinn and Kelly were barred and a man lighter than either proclaimed title winner.
