NONCONFORMISTS LOSING GROUND?

The census in England and Wales is reported to show an increase in the membership of the Established Church and a general decline among the Nonconformist bodies. This is neither surprising nor alarming to the Nonconformists. It is largely explained by the fact of the emigration from the Kingdom to the Dominions over sea and to other countries. It is among the working and middle classes that the free churches have the greater portion of their membership, and these are the classes which make up the bulk of the emigration.

Among the reasons for this movement is also the fact that the Established Church by its connection with the state occupies a position of prestige and privilege not accorded to other religious bodies and which is to some extent distasteful to the latter. They take note also that in Canada, the United States, Australia and New Zealand there are no state churches, and the Presbyterians, Methodists and Baptists are much more numerous relatively to the Church of England than they are in England. This operates to encourage the emigration of Nonconformists, as they are called. We believe the free churches, while they may be losing ground in England and Wales because of emigration are more than holding their ground in the Dominions over sea and in the Empire at large.

BUILDING OPERATIONS.

Most Canadian cities are building up rapidly these times, especially in the west. The building permits issued in April in twenty-nine cities make a total of \$13,500,000, showing a net increase of 15 per cent over April of last year. The larger totals are Toronto, \$3,272,818; Winnipeg, \$1,922,150; Montreal, \$1,711,970; Vancouver, \$1,186,320; Calgary, \$1,127,250. Next in order come Saskatoon, Hamilton, Regina, all well beyond the half million mark.


It is significant that of the 29 cities listed among those rapidly growing 15 are west of the Great Lakes, ten in Ontario, one in Quebec and three in the Maritime Provinces. But the figures for the eastern towns are not large. St. John's April permits totalled \$78,900, an increase of 50 per cent over April a year ago. Halifax, \$11,100, is a decrease of 62 per cent, and Sydney, \$39,465, is also a decrease of 55 per cent. Still the cities are growing all the way from Sydney to Vancouver, with three of the five cities whose building operations run into seven figures each beyond the great lakes.

THE TUNNEL SURVEY DELAYED.

In common with all friends of the Tunnel project we welcomed the vote of \$35,000 for a survey of that important work, on which as we regard it, the welfare of the Province so very largely depends. The expectation was that the survey would be made this summer, so that a report might be promptly laid before Parliament and all suspense be ended as to the practicability of the work. The fact that the summer is rapidly passing and no preparations apparently being made for the survey is causing some anxiety among the friends of the project.

It is in the calm weather of summer that the survey can best be made, and in view of the long delay of twenty years since a complete survey was first promised it is most desirable that it should now be entered upon without more delay. Any Government would desire to please the people so far as can reasonably be done, and it would be pleasing alike to friends and opponents of the Administration to see the survey going forward at as early a date as possible.

LONDON, June 7.—The White-tide holiday gave a brief respite to the coronation preparations, which are now being resumed with increased energy. London, so far as the route of the procession is concerned, is becoming unrecognizable in its garb of new paints, decorations and scaffolding for stands and pillars for street adornments.


In Westminster Abbey itself the structural changes have been completed, for the great coronation ceremony tribunes have been erected with a seating capacity for 8,000 people. The prevailing order of decoration are blue and gold. The program has been fully arranged, and it only remains to hold a number of rehearsals within the coming fortnight for the two hundred persons following the lines of duty near the same features, notably the inclusion for the first time of standard-bearers representing the overseas dominions, India and Wales, as well as England, Scotland and Ireland.

REV. MR. FULLERTON AGAIN.

Rev. Mr. Fullerton in a letter to an evening paper says: "The editor in this morning's Guardian adroitly evades the salient points in my letter including of course the main question involved, an evasion which must be apparent to every intelligent reader. He has however, made it clear that he is emphatically opposed to the attitude which the Protestant churches in Canada have taken in their discussion on the 'Ne Temere' Decree'. It is well to know this."

In reply we beg to say that we have neither adroitly nor otherwise evaded any point, salient or otherwise in Mr. Fullerton's rather pointless letter. The main question as we understood it was the wisdom or unwisdom of making marriage merely a civil contract. Nothing could be clearer than our statement that to this we stand squarely opposed. If the Protestant churches take their stand for secularisation of marriage they can only do so by setting aside the teaching of the great Head of the Christian Church.

What else is apparent in Mr. Fullerton's latest letter is the effort to place The Guardian in a false position. We let that pass for what it is worth. The Guardian is quite as sincerely Protestant as Rev Mr. Fullerton, but without the desire to use such violent and inflammatory language as is sometimes resorted to by those who rather pompously assume the role of champions of the Protestant faith.
