GIVING ADVICE TO YOUNG MEN.

A number of young men and young women who had completed their course and many others who are yet pursuing their studies, were given much good advice by several speakers at the closing exercises on Friday. Among other things they were advised to remain within the Province, and devote their talents and best efforts to building up the land of their birth. This advice was enforced by the reminder that they owed it as a duty to the land that had nurtured them and equipped them for the battle of life.

Now The Guardian would be very glad to have the young men and young women act upon the advice given them and remain at home. For many of them we believe their native land affords as fair a field in which to gain a competence, to live healthfully and to enjoy life as any that they are likely to visit. None the less we fear the good advice will not be generally acted upon. Partly do we think this because the migratory instinct is very strong in the Anglo-Saxon race. If it were not so, we should not now have the greater part of the English speaking people wholly outside the British Isles.

Advancing civilization has brought to every man the knowledge of many countries besides his own, and with this knowledge has come a reasonable desire to visit other lands. The ready means of communication and travel now available afford multiplied facilities for carrying out such a purpose. And to the young man whose time and talents constitute his entire stock in trade, comes the very natural desire to place himself where he thinks he can obtain the best price for what he has to dispose of. He may be content to remove from the rural districts of Charlottetown, or to Summerside, or he may seek fortune farther abroad.

In the last analysis it comes to this. If we are to keep our young men and young women within the Province they must be afforded opportunities for employment in various lines as remunerative as they can find elsewhere. The responsibility is not all on one side. If the young men owe much to the Province, the Province in turn owes something to them. Good advice will not keep them. Abundant, varied and well paying employment the year round would keep them at home. To that end we must have more factories, more industries established in our midst.

The many thousands of Islanders who have gone in recent years to the States have not gone there to take up land or to work upon the farms, except in limited numbers. They have gone to the New England factories, or to the railway, street car, the forests, the mines or other industrial services of that country. We have no mines and our forest wealth is exhausted. Of five sons reared on the farm it may be that one or two will be content to follow farming for a living. It were well, we think, if there were more, but we must take human nature and human inclination as we find them.

If industries were established in our midst only sufficient to supply the wants of our own people in agricultural machines and implements, clothing, boots and shoes, fertilizers, meat packing, canning of fruits and vegetables, and a score of other lines that might be mentioned, it would be easy to keep our sons and daughters at home, until our present population would be doubled. On the

other hand so long as the great bulk of our people are wholly dependent upon farming, the migration will go on and no amount of wise counsel will prevent it, even if half of those who go away do so to their own disadvantage, as so many do.

ELECTIONS TO BE PROUD OF.

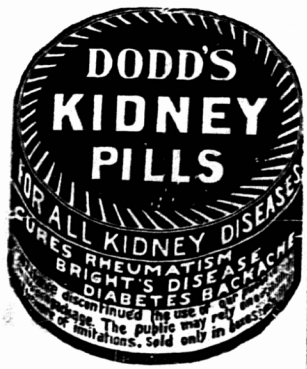
There is a moral grandeur in the voting out of the Scott Act, by its former friends in county after county of Prince Edward Island, that the Prohibitory Law may take its place. Prince has spoken; King's has spoken; Queens will shortly speak. The temperance people had years ago brought that act into force by their unbought votes; they had resisted all attempts to repeal it; they stood manfully by it until a better law was placed on the statute book. Then they waited till the new law was tested in the courts, its constitutionality established and its efficiency proven by actual working.

New, thoroughly convinced that the Provincial Act is the more efficient weapon against the liquor traffic they deliberately set about repealing the old law that the new one may take its place. This is entirely a consistent and well-considered course. It is consistent with their votes which first brought in the Scott Act. It is implementing their votes given at successive plebiscites on the abstract question of prohibition. Many of the men who voted for the Scott Act a quarter century ago have passed away. It is gratifying that their children are of the same way of thinking, steadfast to the same good purpose. These votes from first to last were the votes of honest conviction, the unpurchaseable votes of honest, earnest men who cast their ballots for the welfare of home and native land. What other elections have we that will compare with these in purity and moral grandeur?

There are 22,843 miles of railway in Canada, of which 3,412 miles has been added during the past two years. The C. P. R. has added almost 1,000 miles in that time; the Canadian Northern 1,350 miles and the Grand Trunk 800 miles.
