He had never seen anything like it before. He was boosting the Island generally, and was ready to recommend it to anyone as a place to go for a holiday visit.

The day after this, while visiting at the home of two former Islanders on the outskirts of Winnipeg, I heard the other story that may interest some of you. It happened that the mother of the mistress of the house had left only a week before on return to the Island after having spent a month with her daughter. And the daughter told me that she had several trunks before she could get her mother to settle down and enjoy herself. The daughter presumed it was from thinking about the potatoes back home. Anyway they took her to the shows and had her out visiting and did everything that they possibly could to make her stay a pleasant one. But all with little success. The young lady seemed to be on edge. The young family didn't have a car of their own but there were kind neighbors who had. So one day they planned for a great outing. One of these kind neighbors took them all for a good long drive, certain that the many sights to be seen would interest and please the old lady from the Island. Well, they drove through the parks and all the beautiful spots and show places, the harvesters at work and the gathering in of fine crops and as the afternoon was drawing in they came to a cross roads and the driver said: "Now Mrs. So and So, we just drive to Blank or Blank" mentioning the names of two small towns within a short distance of Winnipeg. I forgot just what the name was. And then he asked her "Which of the two roads would you like us to take." And the daughter told me that she pretty nearly sunk through the seat when she heard her mother reply to the accommodating western friend: "I don't care which way you go. The only road that interests me is the road that leads to P. E. Island."

small, cash payment with the remainder spread over a term of years, a stipulated annual payment covering both interest and an installment on principal. In some of the fruit growing valleys practical-ly all of the available land is already taken up and when an improved holding changes hands the price is so high as to startle an easterner. On Vancouver Island much agricultural land is advertised, just as an instance of values one of the Victoria real estate dealers amongst many other parcels was offering when I happened by "one of the best dairy farms, thirty-five acres and with attractive bungalow for eleven thousand five hundred dollars." The market prices for eggs, poultry and butter seem to be little higher than with us and as far as I could judge the small native fruits are sold at a lower price than our native fruits command here. In all of the cities the real estate dealers have numbers of small homes listed for sale. And you see advertisements in their windows offering eight per cent to those willing to loan money on homes. The buying is largely on the installment basis. Everywhere three, four and five thousand dollar homes are advertised with an initial payment of anywhere from three to six hundred dollars and the balance in monthly payments with interest. It appeared to me that it would be just about as difficult for a young man to keep from buying a home of his own there as it is for a young man to keep from taking on a life insurance policy here. The real estate dealers are after him there as the insurance agents are after him here—probably quite to the advantage of the young man in each case—but there, in the case of the real estate purchase, the young man is putting his savings into the development of his own community and is driving a stake which does much to the him to it. While with us a similarly situated young man putting his savings into life insurance sees his money used for the most part for the development of communities in other provinces and feels the pull of it drawing him after it to the centre where his capital and the capital of others is at work. I must not leave this real estate phase of western development without some reference to the three great corporations which head the list of real estate dealers which are not often listed as such—The C. P. R., the C. N. R. and the Hudson Bay Company. Every interest of those three great corporations is served by the sale and development of the lands which they hold—farm lands in such great areas and city and town lots in such choice parcels. A visit to the West causes one to realize much more fully how it happens that the railways have been and probably still are so much more active in attracting immigration to the west than in persuading the new comers to settle in the east. It's a matter of immediate profit to them now and a continual sharing in the settler's earnings throughout the years that are to come.

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
