**CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH S.S. PICNIC.**—The picnic of the Central Christian Church, which was held at Westville yesterday, proved a fine success. A large crowd attended, which were conveyed from the city by a number of motor boats. Refreshments were served on the grounds and various pastimes were indulged in. The picnicers returned about 10 o'clock all pleased with the splendid afternoon's outing.

**S. S. PICNIC.**—The annual Union Picnic of the Schools of the Tryon Methodist Circuit held at Crapaud on Wednesday 14th inst., proved to be the most successful yet held by this large and flourishing Circuit. The day was an ideal one and in addition to the four schools represented large numbers of the people of the district. The popular pastor who was instrumental in arranging the competitive sports, special thanks is due and to all others who helped to make the picnic such a complete success the Committee in charge desire to offer their sincere thanks. The proceeds amounted to two hundred and seventy-five dollars.

**SHEEP DIPPING.**—Last year during the first part of July, sheep dipping demonstrations were held at Caledonia, High Bank and Hopefield. Between 100 and 125 sheep were dipped at each of these places. The farmers in these districts are unanimous in stating that the dipping was of great benefit to them. The lambs did much better and grew larger. The sheep went into winter quarters in better condition. They were not worried with ticks and consequently did not rub and scratch themselves against the sides of the pen or other objects. As a result the wool was in better condition at shearing time and the average weight of the fleeces was above that of former years.

**ACCIDENT.**—Mr. A. P. Edmunds, of the P. E. I. Hay and Produce Co., met with a somewhat painful though not serious accident yesterday. While moving some bales of hay with a hand truck he fell through a hatchway in the floor to the cellar, a depth of about 10 feet, the truck and ball of hay falling on top of him. His sister, Miss Edmunds, living next door and Mr. W. N. Tanton who was passing by heard his cry for help and hastened to his rescue. An ambulance was summoned and he was taken to his home and medical aid summoned. On examination it was found his head was badly cut and his body somewhat bruised, but fortunately no bones were broken and at last accounts last evening he was doing nicely.

**WATERFORD.**—The semi-annual examination of Waterford School was held on June 29, and the large attendance of parents and visitors showed the interest taken in the school by the people of that district. The pupils by their prompt and ready answers to the difficult questions of their examiners, Miss Evelyn Gaudet, Miss Lauretta Neilligan, teachers of adjoining districts, and Miss Hilda MacDonald, showed the careful training they received from their teacher, Miss Hazel Callaghan. The manner in which they acquitted themselves during the programme of recitations and songs also reflected much credit, both on themselves and on their teacher. At the close of the examination, very complimentary remarks were passed by many of the teachers, and a vote of thanks was tendered to the teacher for the very progressive work done during the past year. Miss Callaghan was then presented with a beautiful gold bracelet and a kindly worded address.

**THE KING vs. ROBERT DEWAR.**—When the Court opened yesterday morning the case of the King v. Robert Dewar was resumed, when evidence of the postmistress and Mr. Butler was heard. Evidence was given which showed that an envelope which was delivered to Mr. Butler by Mr. Dewar from the Bank of Nova Scotia was found in a damaged condition and a note of \$5 was missing. The Crown produced a certificate signed by Mr. Dewar stating that he returned the envelope and had settled with Mr. Butler. The Crown admitted signing the statement, but said he did so to have the matter hushed up. After an hour's deliberation the jury found the prisoner not guilty. J. D. Stewart, K.C., represented the Crown and Mr. J. J. Johnson the prisoner. Bell and others, James Jardine and others, an action arising under an agreement for the sale of a pair of foxes, sold by the defendant to Margaret C. Rogers, and which the plaintiff claims to be the holder of the agreement and seeks to obtain damages upon the ground that the foxes delivered were not according to contract. This case is now before the Court, the counsel for the plaintiff simply opened the case to the jury last evening when the Court adjourned until this morning, when the taking of evidence will be commenced. Stewart and Johnson for plaintiff; Warburton, Martin and McCallum for the defendant.

If the weather had not looked so unfavorable in the morning it is certain that there would have been an immensely greater crowd present.


you every success. Miss Pigott although taken by surprise thanked the people not only for the purse but for the many tokens of kindness received from them.
