way early in the New Year.

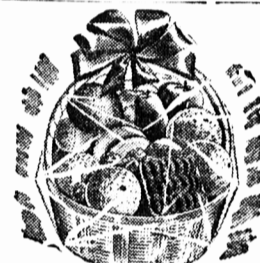
On Monday night, December
