Phillies Break 16-Game Losing Streak To Defeat Braves In 15-Inning Game

(By The Associated Press) Philadelphia Phillies broke a 16-game losing streak yesterday as they took the second game of a National League doubleheader with Boston Braves 5-4 in 15 innings. Boston won their ninth straight while taking the opener from the Phillies 8-3.

Monte Cross gained his sixth straight win while hurling a six-hitter for the triemen's triumph in the opener.

The Braves made seven errors in eight innings behind Bob Loeferer in the second game while the Phillies built up a 3-2 lead but tied it up in the ninth against Bill Lee.

Against Hutchinson in the 15th, the Phils scored twice while the Braves scored once in their side of the inning.

Brooklyn climbed into a second place tie in the National League with Pittsburgh, only one half game out of first place, by noosing out New York Giants last night, 3-2, behind Hal Gregg's five hit pitching.

A crowd of 31,073 paying fans, largest night turnout of the season at Ebbets Field, watched the Dodgers score all their runs off starter Harry Feldman. The first tally came in the second inning on Howie Schultz' double and Eddie Basinski's single and two more romped home in the fifth on Billy Junges' error, a double by Basinski and a single by Goody Rosen who hit safely in his 12th consecutive game.

Detroit Tigers Stretch Lead To One Full Game

(By The Associated Press) Big Rudy York's bat boomed yesterday for Detroit Tigers who grabbed a 6-4 decision from St. Louis Browns and stretched their American League lead to a full game over the Yale New York Yankees.

York roared from his season-long batting slump to belt two singles and a three-run homer for a perfect day at bat, driving in four runs. Joe Hoover homered in the first inning with nobody on and Roger Craig punched across the other Detroit run with a sharp double.

Joe Orrell, who gave only five hits—including George McQuinn's two-run homer—in the six innings he worked, received credit for the victory. Detroit's seventh in eight games, Yankee Pottler, who went six innings for the Browns, was charged with the defeat.

Cleveland Indians hammered three Chicago pitchers for 14 hits, including two homers and three doubles, but could get only three runs across and dropped a 5-3 decision to the White Sox before 2-14 Chicago fans.

It was the Indians' second loss in the current series, with Joe Hayes winning his sixth of the year.

Steve Gromek kept the Sox hitless until the fourth, when singles

Hoop Jr. Slight Favorite To Win Preakness Stakes

BALTIMORE, June 13 (AP) — The Kentucky Derby King, Hoop Jr., was established today the slight favorite for the 56th running of the historic Preakness stakes at Pimlico Saturday at probable odds of 3 to 2, but there were many who thought that F.W. Hooper's champion would be about an even choice at post-time with Walter M. Jefford's Pavot the 1944 juvenile champion.

Pavot, which made a big impression hereabouts yesterday in a trial run, was second choice in the early line at 3 to 1.

Nine of the expected field already were here, and planned light workouts early tomorrow over the track. In excellent shape after light rains earlier in the week.

Pimlico officials said that Col. C.V. Whitney's Jeep, a Derby contender, shipped badly to New York and is out of the Preakness.

Getting back to the odds, a lot of consideration is going to be given on the jockey named Hoop Jr. Eddie Arcaro, who rode the Hoop to a victory in the mud at Louisville last week, was called by his Greenback stable to fill an engagement at Belmont Saturday.

Stand Up And Take it Easy In Cultivating Garden

The easier you take the job of cultivating, the better it is for your plants. A lazy gardener will never wait until the weeds grow big enough to see. It is so much easier to kill them in the sprout stage, by stirring the soil before they come to the surface.

This stirring should be done with a delicate touch; if you work hard at it and dig deep, it will do more harm than good. Deep cultivating, which stirs the soil several inches deep, is definitely out for garden crops. Experiments have demonstrated that deeply stirred soil dries out faster, and that this form of cultivation, which is very hard work, is likely to disturb the roots of your vegetable plants, and do more harm than good.

The right way to cultivate is to keep far enough away from the vegetables, so that you do not even disturb the roots which are close to the surface, for these are the oldest roots and continue to play an important part in sustaining the plant, even when it grows large. And cultivate just deep enough to break the surface crust, and to uproot the tiny white sprouts of weeds, which are just beginning to grow.

Choose your cultivators from a great variety; some gardeners used to have as many as a dozen. You gofer has clubs. Nowadays, you use what you can get, and it is good to know that the old-fashioned goose-neck hoe is a most satisfactory tool for all cultivating tasks. If you need a hand cultivator, use the one with the long handle in small corners where a big hoe cannot function, then a putty knife will make a good one, if you cannot get a better.

Cultivate after every rain, when the soil has dried out enough to crumble. Begin cultivating as soon as your crops appear above the surface, and there is no reason why a weed should ever grow in your garden which requires to be pulled by hand. Except of course in the vegetable row itself. Here, a few hours' work on your knees, pulling up the weeds, usually when you are thinning out the crop, will usually clean up the rows for the entire season.

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N. H. L. Governors To Consider New Entry

MONTREAL, June 13 (CP) — The National Hockey League board of governors, meeting here tomorrow, will consider an application made tonight for a franchise for Philadelphia.

The application was made by Len Leo, a former Montrealer now residing in New York, who may build a new arena in Philadelphia and play the team in Philadelphia.

Besides the application of Mr. Leo, the N. H. L. management committee earlier today entertained a proposal that all the clubs sign an agreement to remain in the League for a term of 15 years.

The management committee conference was attended by Gen. J. R. Kilpatrick of Madison Square Garden, New York; Sen. Don Raymond of the Montreal Forum; J. S. Norris of the Detroit Olympia; Bill Tobin of the Chicago Stadium; Art Ross of Boston Garden and Conn Smythe of Toronto Maple Leaf Garden.

The board is believed to have one of the recommendations to be presented tomorrow would be to abolish the so-called "gate receipts" which has been the object of considerable fun-poking and no little discussion during the last year. London Polish Gov't Rejects Negotiations

LONDON, June 13 (AP) — Polish Government-in-London refused today to recognize the authority of the three major powers to supervise the formation of a new Polish national unity administration at a conference set to open Friday in Moscow.

The Polish government-in-exile proposed meeting as an outright concession to Russia and clung to the hope that the Moscow negotiations would break down.

In a tense and troubled atmosphere they planned tentatively to hold a broad-based cabinet session to place before the world a formal protest against the latest developments in the negotiations.

"Never, never will our people recognize this agreement," said a spokesman for the group. "Never will we recognize a so-called government formed in this manner."

And never, he emphasized, has the London Government acceded to the Crimea conference agreement in a broad-based provisional government.

It was learned in responsible quarters that Julian Zakowski, 48-year-old broker and one of three London Poles not connected with the Government who were invited to turn down the bid on the grounds that he never had been connected with politics.

Regarded as a Liberal Socialist, Zakowski was understood to have been nominated to attend the conference by the Russian-backed Warsaw provisional government.

It appeared obvious that the status of the London group in its relations with the Western Allies had plummeted to the lowest point since it sought refuge here after Poland's fall in 1939. Failure of Britain and the United States to consult the London Government about the forthcoming meeting was an unusual diplomatic step, since both countries maintain formal relations with the London group.

These relations, however, have been on little more than a token basis since Stanislaw Mikolajczyk, peasant-born former premier who resigned from the London Government in an argument over settling the dispute with Russia, taking with him the powerful Peasant Party.

It was learned in responsible quarters that the Western Allies are counting heavily upon Mikolajczyk and Wincenty Witos, likewise a former peasant premier, to play a major role in forming a broad-based Polish Government.

Dominion Chess Tournament Tie

WINNIPEG, June 13 (CP) — Canon H. L. Roy of Winnipeg, president of the Canadian Chess Federation, announced here today that first place money in the Dominion Chess Tournament which ended in Saskatoon last night will be divided between Abie Yanofsky of Winnipeg and Frank Yerhoff of Regina.

Yanofsky, defending national champion, finished the 13-round tournament in a tie for first place, each with 10½ points.

Canon Roy said second place money will be divided between J. J. Belson of Toronto and Nathan Dinkley of Winnipeg; each finished with 9½ points.

Yanofsky and Yerhoff will toss to decide who will hold the championship trophy in the coming year.

Both names will be inscribed on the trophy.

Last night's championship tie was the second in the history of the tournament. The first came in Montreal in 1889.

Lord Haw Haw Faces Early Trial

RESTRICTIONS RELAXED

Federal Cabinet To Meet Today

OTTAWA, June 13 (CP) — With the normal routine of the year's Federal Government business behind schedule, Prime Minister Mackenzie King and his Cabinet meet tomorrow to survey the post-election situation.

One of the major tasks is to prepare for the regular session of parliament which normally opens in midwinter but this time cannot take place before mid-August.

While the return of the Government with a working majority was indicated in the debate of the civilian vote in Monday's general election, the exact parliamentary picture will not be clear until the results of the service vote is announced June 19.

The strength of the Liberal party in the new House of Commons may be reduced by the vote and the seats of three ministers, including Mr. King himself in Prince Albert, may be jeopardized. The others who may be affected are Navy Minister Abbott in Montreal-St. Antoine and other ministers who are besting and were in their constituencies for election day are drifting back to the Capital so that the attendance is expected at tomorrow's cabinet meeting.

What About Conference?

Among the decisions facing Mr. King are whether to return to the San Francisco conference on when and how to work in his projected visit with President Truman at Washington. The Canadian delegation at San Francisco now is headed by Norman Robertson, Under Secretary of State for External Affairs.

When the time comes to sign the charter establishing the United Nations organization, however, it is believed the Government will want Canada's signature affixed by a Cabinet Minister. Mr. King, as Secretary of State for External Affairs, ever if he finds it impossible to make the trip he may designate another minister, possibly Justice Minister St. Laurent, to represent Canada at the close of the conference and sign the document.

Will Visit Washington

Prior to the election President Truman invited Mr. King to Washington to resume tie discussion which took place frequently between Mr. King and the late President Roosevelt. The Prime Minister was unable to go at the time but expressed the wish to accept the invitation as soon as possible after the election.

The meeting will take place as soon as a time suitable to both can be arranged, most likely before Mr. Truman leaves for his early morning's election. Prime Minister Churchill and Marshall, St. Sialin. The session of parliament which will open late in August or early in September will be brief, far less than usual but likely will have some important international agreements to ratify, including the charter of the world organization which will come from San Francisco.

The budget with provisions for changes in taxation will be a major item and preparations towards it are already under way.

Cabinet changes, of which a number are possible in view of the vacancy in the office of Postmaster General, defeat of two ministers in Monday's election and possible defeat of others when the soldier vote is announced, will not be made immediately.
