WOOLKNIT TRIMS NEW STYLE

Wood knitted details in hand interpretation as well as machine are more and more popular as fall fashions are revealed.

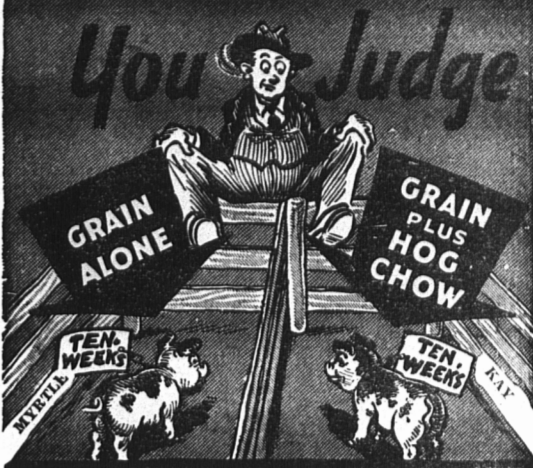
