WINNIPEG, Dec. 20 (CP)—Five futures moved within a narrow range today on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange and closed 1/2 cent higher to 3/4 cent lower.

CHICAGO, Dec. 20 (AP)—Gain futures markets were unsettled today, the old crop deliveries at times holding steady to firm only to ease back when the deferred contracts, July and September, broke under the pressure of liquidation.
