(Canadian Press) BERLIN, Mar. 9.—Greece has been added to the list of nations recognizing Soviet Russia. The recognition accorded in the agreement signed at Berlin, is without conditions.

(British United Press) PARIS, Mar. 9.—Quai Dorsay has issued yellow book documents regarding the negotiations of French security during the after peace conference. It shows that the French envisaged the detachment of the Rhineland and the creation of a separate state under the league. It also contains the documents where Lloyd George referred when he said recently that Wilson and Clemenceau signed a pact during his absence from the peace conference. The yellow book shows that the pact was incorporated in the treaty almost integrally.

FIRST WEEK OF DOMINION PARLIAMENT SESSION WAS MOST DISAPPOINTING ONE

Debate on Speech From Throne Occupied Most of Time Thus Far and Will Be Carried Into Next Week - Conservatives Who Have Been Holding Fire Expected to Make Their Presence Felt Shortly.

There have been a few ripples on the surface and a few wifolious sounds, but nothing to raise the hair or give rise to party enthusiasm. All this week has been devoted to the debate on the address.

Board of Trade Will Take Up Express Matters

The following communications addressed to President Macdonald of the Board of Trade speaks for itself.

Ottawa, March 8th.—Express companies have asked the Board of Railway Commission to allow them an increased flat rate of 5 percent all round or an alternative of 2 1/2 percent increase on second class rates.

Preliminary hearings have been held by the railway commission in every Province except Prince Edward Island. Final hearing is now being held in Ottawa.



SEA LORDS MAY QUIT

Reports from London say that Earl Beatty and the other British sea lords are about to resign in a body, as a protest against the Labor attitude towards the Singapore naval base. If they do so it will embarrass Labor and give the Conservative party a chance to appeal to the country on the plea of protecting the navy. Kingston R. M. C. Case Has Been Settled

(Canadian Press) KINGSTON, Ont., Mar. 9.—The Arnold case has been settled. Major General Sir A. C. Mcdonnell, commandant of the R. M. C. on his return from Ottawa yesterday communicated with Major Arnold to the effect that Cadet Arnold had good reasons for leaving the R. M. C. without leave and that his statements regarding these reasons were justified.

The Commandant promises that when the investigation is completed, adequate punishment will be meted out to these responsible for the condition of affairs and invites Cadet Arnold to return to the college.

Four Civilians Killed in Riot in Bombay

(Canadian Press) BOMBAY, B. I., March 9.—Four civilians were killed and five others injured when police fired on rioting cotton mill strikers here today. Military were later called out to deal with the situation and renewal of the disturbance being feared. There has been much incendiary since the strike started.

New Low Record For French Franc

FIVE ESSENTIALS If you will stop a while to think into it you will find that a rightly rounded christian life has five essential characteristics. I mean essential in the same sense as that light is an essential to the eye. The eye's seeing depends wholly on light. If it does not see light, by and by, it cannot see light. The ear that hears no sound loses the power to hear sound. Light is essential to the healthful eye; sound to the ear; air to the lungs; blood to the heart. Just as really are these five things essential to a strong healthful christian life.

The second of these is a heart-lore for the old Book of God. Not reading it as a duty—taking a chapter at night because you feel you must. I do not mean that just now. But reading it because you love to; as you would a love letter or a letter from home. Thinking about it as the writer of the one hundred and nineteenth psalm did. Listen to him for a moment in that one psalm, talking about this book: "I delight," "I will delight," "My delight" "in all mine times," "I love," "Oh! how I love," "I do love,
