## Bevis Hangs For Murder of Fulton

HALIFAX, Feb. 11.—Lewis Marshall Bevis paid the supreme penalty for the killing of Police Officer Charles Fulton at 12.15 o'clock yesterday morning. Bevis was hanged on a scaffold in the county jail yard.

With a cigarette between his lips, the condemned man mounted the steps to the scaffold and with a "good-bye boys" to those who stood near him, stepped forward to where Hangman Ellis awaited him. Less than a dozen people witnessed the hanging.

Throughout the entire evening, Bevis' spiritual adviser, Adjutant Harding, of the Salvation Army was with him in his cell. Adjutant Harding accompanied him, as he walked with head held high and firm step, from the jail to the gallows.

A last minute effort to secure a stay of execution was made by the local branch of the Great War Veterans yesterday afternoon when a telegram was dispatched to Premier King by A. J. Cameron, secretary of the Association.

A reply to this wire, received stated that the representations made in it were being communicated immediately to Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice, for his consideration. This message was signed by F. A. McGregor, private secretary to the Prime Minister. As far as could be learned no further word was received up to the time the execution took place.

## 91 Miles of Branch Lines Built By C. N. R. in 1924

OTTAWA, Feb. 11.—The Canadian National Railway expended \$1,650,751 on branch line construction work in the calendar year 1924. Estimates expenditure on branch lines in 1925 is \$8,766,585. The whole program of the Canadian National Railway involves construction of 548 miles at an authorized expenditure of \$15,436,000.

A report of the Department of Railways tabled in the House of Commons today, gives full details of all work done on all branch lines. A total of 91.5 miles of tracks were laid; 38.5 miles were ballasted; a proportionate amount of grading work was carried out and 72.6 miles of telegraph lines was added to the system. The greatest progress was made on the Peoples, Sask.; Prince Albert, Northeast, Sask.; Gravebourg, Sask.; St. Rose Du Lac, Manitoba, and the Grande Preshiere, Que. branches. Some further work which will practically complete these branches is provided for in 1925. The only branches for
