Death At Aldershot Of Lieut. P. Morris

The death occurred at Aldershot Military Camp on Wednesday, Dec. 13, of Lieut. Patrick Morris, who, prior to enlisting in the Army, had been a member of the local division of the R.C.M.P. The late Mr. Morris was born at Donaldson thirty-six years ago, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Morris. He received his early education in Donaldson and then attended St. Dunstan's University for some time. For some years he was a member of the enforcement squad, working under the authority of the Prohibition Commission, and joined the R.C.M.P. when the organization took over provincial police duties here in 1932. Enlisting in the army in 1934 as private the late Lieut. Morris rose through the various non-commissioned grades and was commissioned lieutenant in 1943. He was posted to the 1st Canadian Trench Mortar Battalion, and five children, the eldest of whom is eleven and the youngest two and a half years.

The remains arrived in the City this evening and the funeral will be held Saturday morning at 10 o'clock at the Holy Most Redeemer.

Fine Paintings By P. E. Island Artist

There is an atmosphere of peace and stillness about Mabel McCulloch's (Mrs. D.M. Gass) paintings. Her exhibition at the Memorial Art Galleries, which cannot but have a restful effect on the subconsciousness of the average visitor to the gallery.

Living in a war period does not make for tranquility of spirit. The artist's mind is troubled by the mental strain resulting from trying to make ends meet with a largely inflated dollar; and the natural, and therefore, the worry of Canadian parents, wives, and kindred, for the boys overseas - all these things are conducive to a chaotic inner life.

To stroll about the Harris Art Gallery and look over the rural scenes as beautiful life under the magic of Miss McCulloch's brush, is to enter, almost upon a momentary, a world of peace and harmony.

There is no sense of conflict in her work, no stimulus to tumultuous passions. Instead, there is a feeling of fulfillment and satisfaction, arising from the atmosphere of harmony and peace which pervades all her paintings.

The "Margaree" painting is a work of particular charm, which is a miniature of her woodland scenes which she serves the highest praise. Nor will a visitor fail to examine the "Snow" painting, "Inkman Lane," "Rustico" and "Autumn".

Apart from her flower studies, which are miniature gems, Miss McCulloch has twenty oil paintings on display. They can be seen on this and tomorrow afternoon as well as on Saturday evening.

Educational Aid To Returned Servicemen

MONTREAL, Dec. 13 - (CP) - A nation-wide plan for educational aid to demobilized personnel of the armed forces was announced today by Col. Wilfrid Bovey, chairman of the Canadian Legion Committee on Education.

Col. Bovey said that the necessary approval of the Federal Government has been obtained and that regional committees of the Legion were studying the plan. Under the system, provincial educational authorities would be recognized and regional committees would be completely autonomous with the National Committee serving as a clearing house.

Under the plan, each regional committee would make its own contacts with Provincial Governments and universities in its district. All textbooks and handbook materials prepared by the Canadian Legion would be made available by the Federal Government to any Provincial Government wishing to use it.
