EDITORIAL NOTES.

A prominent French commander, General de Boisdeffre, whose name has become so well known in connection with the Dreyfus case, has long been a prominent figure in French politics.

The death of ex-Consul Keim was announced in the Patriot of Friday evening. In making some inquiries by telephone in regard thereto the GUARDIAN was informed that in was ex-Consul Kane who was dead, and it was so stated in our columns yesterday.

Difficulties between Norway and Sweden do not appear to be nearing a solution. Norway complains of a clause in the constitution which makes a minister, who is responsible only to the Swedish Rikstag, the real director of the foreign affairs of both countries.

There is a distinct and hopeful movement of farmers from Minnesota and Dakota into Manitoba and the Northwest Territories. The Minnesotans have become alarmed, and some angry speeches have been made in their legislature denouncing Canada, the Canadian Pacific Railway and everything Canadian.

Correspondents are puzzling their brains over successive announcements on the post office bulletin board that so many bags are brought over by the ice-boats and so many left behind. They say that these numbers do not correspond from day to day.

To unite Cape Town and Cairo by means of iron rails is the mission of Cecil Rhodes, who recently visited England, accompanied by Sir James Sivewright, who, as the Minister of Railways for Cape Colony built the great railway system that extends almost across Africa from Table Bay to Beira, and which is an unbroken line from Cape Town to Delagoa Bay.

President Paul Kruger, of the South African Republic, known the world over as "Oom" Paul has just passed his seventy-third birthday. He is known as the uncompromising opponent of British interests.

Smith, Miss Pippy and the President, were appointed to consider and report upon the question of a bureau of labor with a view to evolving a practical, working system.

It was resolved that future meetings of the Local Council shall be limited to an hour and a half in duration unless urgent business requires a longer sitting.

The annual reports of the several affiliated societies were held over till the next meeting of Council when several resolutions offered by the societies will be considered. These include resolutions in favor of compulsory education and one from the W. C. T. U. against the sale of tobacco to minors.

The annual reports of the officers of the Council were read and received. The Treasurer's report showed that the expenditure had slightly exceeded the receipts. The Council then adjourned.
