EDUCATING THE BLIND.—Some weeks ago The Guardian referred to a visit from Mr. W. C. Holmes of Toronto representing the Canadian National Institutes for the Blind. Arrangements had been made by the institute to teach, free at their own homes, any blind children who desired such teaching and Miss Lexie L. Penny, of Murray Harbour was appointed teacher and agent of the Institute for P. E. Island. Miss Penny has already toured a considerable portion of the province looking for blind pupils desiring an education but she has succeeded in locating only three who are willing to take instructions. Fortunately there is little blindness in this province but it is quite probable here are still some whom Miss Penny has not been able to reach. The opportunity of securing for blind, an education and a means of earning one's own livelihood should not be missed. If there are any who have not made themselves known to Miss Penny they should do so at once in their own interests. The friends or relatives of any blind young people would do very much for the latter by communicating with Miss Penny at Murray Harbour.

CABLE ACROSS PICTOU HARBOR.—The Maritime Telegraph and Telephone Company have completed laying a submarine cable across Pictou Harbor says the Advocate. The greatly increased business between Pictou and New Glasgow made the laying of this cable a necessity. The cable runs from the foot of Colerains Street across the harbor to the Old Ferry Wharf landing at Fisher's Grant. It is a 4 core cable, carrying 4 No. 12 copper wires. This will give a total of six separate and direct wires between Pictou and New Glasgow, as follows: Four No. 12 copper wires, one No. 14 copper wire, and one No. 12 iron wire. The cable was laid under the direction of G. F. Jacobs, Supt. of Construction. The lag, from Fisher's Grant to New Glasgow is completed.
