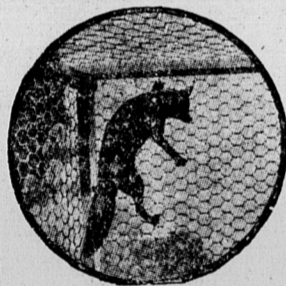

### WEARS BULGARIAN COSTUMES

KARLOVO, Bulgaria, August 31.—King Boris, the bachelor monarch, has extreme national sentiments and insists on having everything around him Bulgarian. His sister, Princess Eudoxia, follows the example of her brother and nearly always wears Bulgarian costume.

One of the King's hobbies is the collection of knickknacks and furniture reproducing national ideas and the picturesque colorings prevalent in this country. Boris has just given instructions for the building here in the Valley of Roses of a summer villa in the style of the ordinary peasant cottage. Great timber will surround the house and its entrance, all made of national timbers of various species bearing national motifs. The peasants of the neighborhood carrying out the local custom in paying homage to their sovereign, have presented the King numerous tapestries, embroideries, pieces of furniture and ornaments carved in Bulgarian style. As soon as the villa is ready for occupation, which will be next summer, the King intends to pass several weeks every year in his new residence, and will take advantage of the famous thermal baths nearby.
