Bank Cashier Got Five From Robber Squad

CHICAGO, April 16.—S. B. Winoski, cashier of the State Bank of Cicero, a suburb, successfully defended the bank against a band of six automobile bandits today, killing one robber, wounding two and capturing two others. Only the driver of the bank escaped. The six men drove up to the bank, soon after it opened this morning and five of them entered with drawn revolvers.

POSTING SERVICE TAKEN OVER—The Acadia Posting Service of Springhill, N. S., in taking over from the Whitlock Agency the bill posting rights of Charlottetown, affords another example of outside initiative snapping up from under the very eyes of local business men what appears to be a very promising proposition. Mr. Whitlock, before offering to the Acadia company the Service which he had been operating successfully here for the last twelve years, presented his proposition to some business men of the city and was turned down. The Service includes 735 feet of boardings in the city. If a rural route could be established throughout the country, with boardings at every town on the route (a project which Mr. Whitlock was prevented from carrying out by illness) it might prove a highly successful proposition. The Springhill company, who expect to begin operations here on the 1st of May, are figuring on spending about \$500 in repairing and in refitting the local service.

BRITISH GOVERNMENT PAYS OFF TWENTY-FIVE MILLIONS OF DEBT

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Receipt of \$25,000,000 from the British government as first installment on the debt of \$122,000,000 for silver purchased during the war was reported to the Treasury today by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York. Payment was made through J. P. Morgan and Company, as fiscal agents. Of the amount paid today \$18,000,000 representing a reduction of the principal and \$7,000,000 interest from April 15, 1919. The next installment falls due on May 15 when \$12,000,000 in principal and \$5,000,000 of interest becomes payable.

POLES PREPARE TO ATTACK LITHUANIA

KOVNO Lithuania, April 17.—On the eve of the conference at Brussels between the Poles and Lithuanians for settling the differences between the two countries, the Poles, according to Lithuanian newspapers, are making troops in the Vilna area and rumors are current in Kovno that they plan an attack in the event Vilna is awarded to Lithuania.

General Zeligowski, head of the Polish "irregular" troops, is now in charge in Vilna, and it is learned here that additional Polish troops, amply supplied with munitions, are arriving by train and not sleep at night, and are preparing for any eventuality. In consequence of a recent "egg-plant" incident in Vilna the League of Nations' Control Commission headed by Colonel Chardigny, has decided not to return there until a better government is established. It is contended by this commission that the egg-plant was prearranged, the members citing the fact that photographers were on hand ready to take snapshots. The Lithuanian delegates to the Brussels conference left today. The Foreign Office is impressing on the people here that Vilna will be awarded to Lithuania and Grodno area will go to Poland.

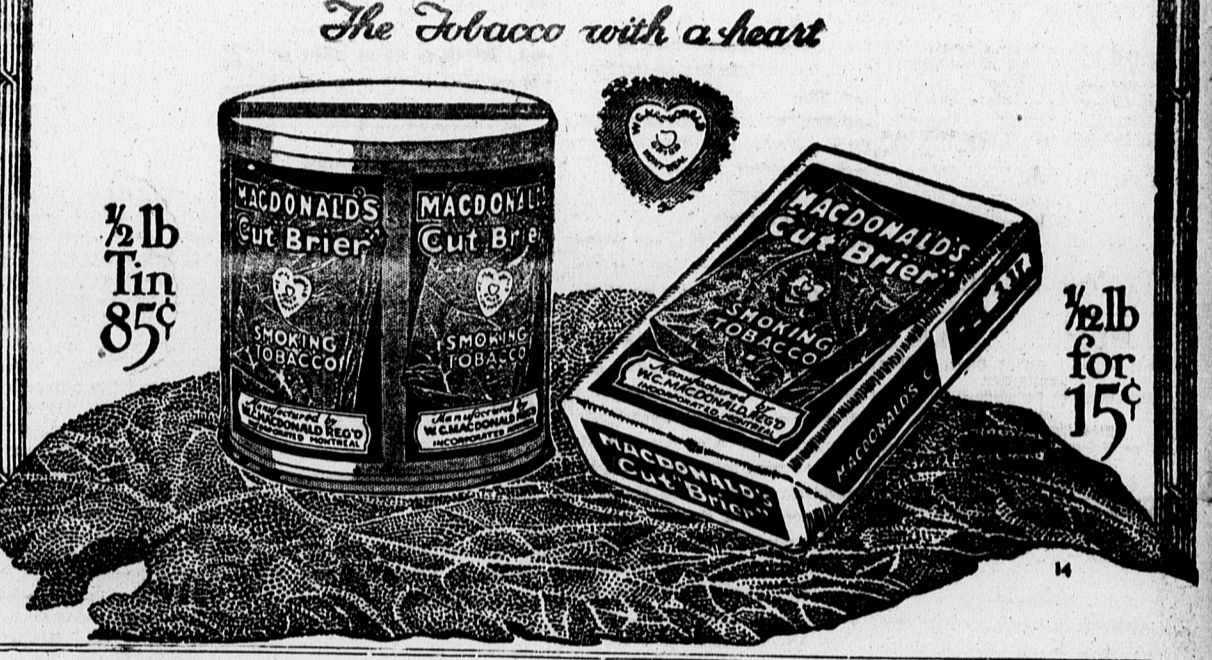
