Moore on his right and left respectively.

It was after 10 o'clock when the toast list was ntered upon. After her Majesty's health had been duly honored with the National Anthem, the President of the United States was proposed and in response Dr. Taylor eulogized the American people and President McKinley. Mr. Cochrane, C. E. of Boston, also spoke warmly in behalf of his country and its ruler. For the Governor General, Hon. F. de St. C. Brecken eloquently responded, and after paying tribute to Lord and Lady Aberdeen he spoke in very warm terms of the guest of the evening. Hon. B. Rogers fittingly responded for his Honor the Lieutenant Governor, whose health was heartily drunk. The Attorney General in proposing the health of the guest of the evening spoke in discriminating terms of praise of the long journalistic and political career of Mr. Laird and of his wide influence in promoting every good cause. Hon. D. Farquharson made a very happy and eloquistic speech concluding with the statement that no man in Charlottetown possessed the respect and confidence and esteem of its citizenship more than Mr. Laird.

Judge Warburton also spoke with much feeling in support of the toast. Mr. James Byrnes paid an eloquent paegyric to Mr. Laird after which the toast was drunk with full honors. Mr. Laird on rising to respond was received with prolonged and hearty cheering. He spoke with much feeling returning thanks to all the speakers for their kind words and wishes; to the press for kind notices of his appointment; to the citizens for their confidence and support in carrying out the plans of water works and sewerage. Proceeding he spoke in a very happy and pleasant view of various points in his public career that had been touched upon by other speakers, concluding amid great applause, three cheers and a vigor.

Cuba and Philippines.

NEW YORK, October 16.—A special cable from Paris to the World says:—
Senor Abarzuza, a member of the Spanish peace commission, was interviewed to-day. "Has the United States demanded the whole Philippines group?" he was asked.

"She has not so far," replied Senor Abarzuza, "and will, I think, be content with the Ladronez, or part of them, perhaps with Guam, which she has already taken. However, as to that I give only my impression."

"Has not the United States displayed great magnanimity in not demanding indemnity?"
"Cuba is indemnity according to our view. The commission will not have to consider any question of money indemnity."

"Is there no claim for the Maine?"
"That does not fall within the scope of the commission."

"Is it true that a serious hitch has arisen between the commissioners and that a break in negotiation is possible?"
"This rumor is a ridiculous exaggeration. No hitch has arisen."

"On what ground can Spain ask the United States to assume the Cuban debt?"
"Cuba is the key to the Gulf of Mexico, and has long been necessary to the United States. For that reason alone she might take upon herself the Cuban debt. When the United States gets Cuba she will instantly secure control of the customs, which will enable her to effect a conversion of the debt and reduce the interest from 6 to 2 per cent."

"You imply that Spanish relinquishment of sovereignty means American annexation, not Cuban independence?"
"I certainly do; our relinquishment means the transfer of sovereignty to America with all its rights, therefore also its obligations."

"Does that apply equally to the Philippines and their debt?"
"No. That case is absolutely opposite. America would be extremely unwise to start a policy of colonial expansion. Taking the Philippines would mean a colonial civil service and more ships."

"But the American people have fully decided to take them?"
"They cannot have done so, because they have not counted the cost?"
