Annual Meeting Montague Community Welfare League

The annual meeting of the Montague Community Welfare League was held at the Curling Rink on Thursday night, November 4th.

The meeting, which was attended by a large number of members, was presided over by the President, Mr. A. D. MacLure. After the minutes of the last regular and annual meetings were read by the secretary, Mr. C. A. Shaw, which were adopted as read, Mr. L. M. MacKinnon then presented the minutes of the last regular meeting that the cemetery had been put in good condition, and that the south side had been opened, plowed and graded, and would be seeded in the spring, thereby increasing the cemetery to almost twice its present size. He further stated that the financial status of the cemetery and was quite satisfactory. It was proposed that the rink management committee, reported that the sound system had been completely rebuilt, and would not require any further attention. He commended the fine work accomplished by the manager, Mr. Lorne Wigginton, who did not stint his time and attention to making his work conscientiously and well. Messrs. Cecil Beck and Ben Phipson were appointed as directors, replacing Dr. R. W. Beck and A. D. MacLure who retired this year. The building committee comprised Keir Clark, Bruce Riley and J. J. Stewart. For the coming year the rink managing committee will include, Cecil Beck, Charlie MacLure, J. J. Stewart and Carl Boehner. In addition, the rink committee is composed of Dr. P. MacIntyre, L. M. MacKinnon and R. W. Beck. Mr. Don Sanson was appointed as auditor, and Mr. C. A. Shaw was elected secretary.

Mr. T. Mercer showed an informative and interesting temperance film, "Liquor Lure".

Evening Session The Evening Session opened at 8 p.m. with the vice-president presiding. After the meeting was called to order, the secretary read the minutes of the afternoon session, which were approved as read. The Resolutions were read by Rev. D. W. MacPherson. Each resolution brought forth considerable discussion, and the following resolutions: (1) Be it resolved that the Eastern Presbytery Young People affirm their interest in the evangelization of Christian youth through such methods as personal evangelization and preaching missions, and that we give expression to this evangelization in our Christian life.
