MEXICAN CENTRAL OPENED FOR TRAFFIC

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—The Government has been notified that the Mexican Central Railway has been opened for traffic to Manzanillo, on the West Coast. This will place exporters in British Columbia on an equal footing with those in eastern Canada as regards direct communication by ocean and rail-ways with the City of Mexico. The Dominion Government subsidizes direct steamships line to Mexico both on the Atlantic and Pacific.

SERIOUS TRAGIC ACCIDENT AT AMHERST

AMHERST, Jan. 2.—A serious coasting accident occurred Friday afternoon on Eddy Street hill, the steepest incline in Amherst. Willie Turner a lad about twelve or thirteen years of age, and a son of Joseph Turner of this town was the victim of the accident. He was ascending the hill when he was knocked down by a descending sled. Before he could regain his feet he was struck and run over by another sled which was following the first. The sharp nose of the runner struck his knee inflicting a bad wound, tearing the cords and a number of the blood vessels. Medical aid was summoned and it was found necessary to give anesthetics, under which the patient was kept for several hours while the wound was being dressed. It was necessary to take fourteen or fifteen stitches in the treatment of the injury.

FROM PORT HUR TO SUBURBY

PORT ARTHUR, Ont., Jan. 2.—"Our next project, which must be put into active operation soon," said D.D. Mann, vice president of the Canadian Northern railway recently "is the building of a road from Port Arthur to Suburby. This is an absolute and immediate essential. We are going to get after it right away as soon as the next parliament meets. We have to get assistance from the government to build this line."

"How will this newly-acquired Duluth line help your road out in providing an outlet east?" was asked. "As far as being a highway of transportation" said Mr. Mann, "we do not intend to ever use it as such. We mean Canada to have the entire benefit of our western roads and to get the total revenue accruing therefrom. If we haul wheat and east-bound freight to eastern ports by way of Duluth the States are going to get the benefit of it. We do not mean such a condition of affairs to exist at all. Sixty per cent of the cost of transportation is spent in the localities through which the freight passes and why should not the Dominion benefit by this? When we build east again think of the immense country our road will open up east of Port Arthur and north of the transcontinental now building. Why the possibilities resulting from the building of a road through this territory are innumerable."

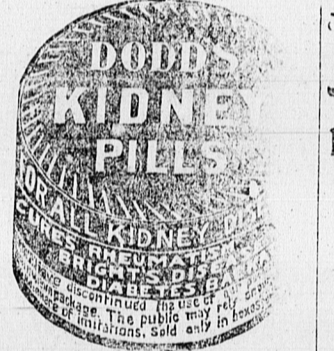
GUILTY ITALIAN IN DORCHESTER
