

IMPORTANT READING MATTER SELECTED FROM THIS WEEK'S NEWS FOR THE GUARDIAN'S SATURDAY SUBSCRIBERS

WEDNESDAY

The remains of the late John Francis Hughes, son of Frank and Mrs. Hughes, Charlottetown, arrived by the express last night from St. John, accompanied by two brothers of the deceased, Anthony and William, of Amherst.

The unfortunate man was killed on Tuesday evening in St. John on the I. C. R., where he had gone to work that morning. He was struck by the engine of a freight train and was almost instantly killed, one leg being almost severed from the body, the other broken, and arm broken, his face disfigured and his head being also badly cut at the back.

A very large number of friends of the deceased and the family were at the station to meet the brothers and the remains.

The following from a St. John exchange of yesterday morning reveals a sad story in connection with the young man's unfortunate end.

The man who was accidentally killed on the I. C. R., near the Island yard, on Tuesday last, and was buried in Fernhill cemetery on Sunday as Frederick Dill of Charlottetown, John Hughes, aged 23 years, a native of Charlottetown, P. E. Island. The identification was made this morning by two brothers of the deceased, Anthony and William Hughes, of Amherst, who arrived here on the morning train.

The young man said that their brother had worked with them in their barber shop at Amherst for some

months and on Monday last packed a few things together and decided to go to Halifax. He missed the train and then determined, against their protests, to come on to St. John. Anthony said when he read in the papers of the accident in St. John he had a presentiment that it might be his brother, and as the end of the week brought no word of his brother's movements he communicated his fear to Chief Carter of Amherst. Mr. Hughes said that the Amherst chief interment be delayed until the arrival here of the brothers, and they were therefore greatly surprised when they reached the city this morning to find that the body had been buried on Sunday. The news from Montreal that Frederick Dill was alive strengthened their belief that the victim of the accident was their brother, and so they had the grave opened and at once identified the remains as that of their brother who left them only a week ago in the best of health.

Messrs. Hughes at once started to make arrangements to take the body to their old home in Charlottetown, where their father and mother, and other members of the family reside, but found that a number of preliminaries had to be arranged. In the first place the body had to be interred on the permit of Coroner Berryman as Frederick Dill, and only the coroner could give the necessary permit for its removal from the city. Messrs. Hughes said that their bro-

ther was a particularly bright young man, who had done exceptionally well at school, leading in his examinations. He was a carpenter by trade and a clever workman and a general favorite.

When the grave was opened this morning the body was found to be still well preserved and the brothers immediately recognized the features. They also recognized the clothing and a ring the deceased was wearing. They stated that it would be a hard blow to their poor mother, who was greatly attached to her son.

An inquest will be held on Friday evening at 7.30 in the police court and a jury has been empanelled.

The death occurred in Charlottetown yesterday of John Hogan, 64 Queen St. after an illness of about six months. The deceased had been employed with T. B. and D. J. Riley, Tobacconists, up to the time of his illness. He leaves to mourn a widow and the following sons: Frank and Arthur at home and William, in Salem, also one daughter, Mary, married in Boston, and a sister, May, in Quincy. His passing away at this time is keenly felt by the family. The deceased's son Arthur, is lying at home very ill and the late Mr.

—A serious fire broke out on Sunday at the home of Philip Cameron, Wellington, which resulted in the loss of his house and barn. The fire started from a spark from the kitchen flue lighting under the shingles of main house, giving the fire considerable headway before being noticed. The neighbors did all they could but the wind blew heavy and the fire spread rapidly. Nothing was saved. Considerable hay, grain and some machinery, also household furniture and clothing were lost. The heavy loss will be felt as they are an old couple and had no insurance.

Strathie dated at St. John's, Newfoundland, May 9, and addressed to a friend in this city, tells that after having been confined to bed altogether, he is permitted to sit up two hours a day, and finds himself making real progress toward permanent recovery. The enforced rest in bed, he states, was merely the method of treatment which the reverend gentleman's many friends in Charlottetown and elsewhere will be glad to learn is proving effectual.

Little Willie Stewart, a young chap who has been visiting in Charlottetown for a few days, the guest of his grandfather, Mr. Nelson, 212 Cumberland St., met with a serious accident last evening. Men employed in the work of cleaning out some old

books from the Colonial building had erected a wooden slide about three feet wide and this was placed at a slope from the first story to the ground. The little fellow along with others was sliding down this and one of these excursions he came down unexpectedly and struck the ground with that his right leg was fractured midway between the ankle and the knee. He was taken to the Charlottetown Hospital and Dr. Dorsey was called in to set the injured member. He was reported as doing nicely last evening. The little fellow belongs to Loyalist and intended returning to his home this morning.

—Andrew Mooney of Little Harbor is hauling away two cars of mussel mud from Souris. Mr. Mooney had to abandon the South road in consequence of its poor condition. This road is eloquently pleading for some fixing up and it is hoped that for the common good, the roadmaster will attend to this matter at once.

The passing of the late Mrs. Benj. Rodd of Brackley Point Road, at the early age of 31, deserves more than a passing notice. She was the second daughter of Isaac T. and Mrs. Saunders. Winsloe, and by her gentle disposition endeared herself to all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. The deceased always lived a quiet Christian life until she was suddenly called away from the activities of life to the Home above where sin and sorrow are unknown. Besides her sorrowing parents and husband, she leaves to mourn, two sisters, Mrs. Albert R. Wise, Milton, and Miss Blanche at home, and one brother Lee West Saunders, also at home. The funeral services which were largely attended, were conducted by Rev. L. J. Wason, the pall-bearers being Lee Horne, Herb. Bryenton, Louis MacMillan, Stanley Prowse, William Younker and Fred.
