Teutons Yielding To Roumanians

(Canadian Press Despatch.) BERLIN, Aug. 30.—(Via London)—The abandonment of part of Transylvania to the Roumanians, is forecasted in despatches from newspaper correspondents at the Austrian army headquarters.

GREEK ARMY TO BE RE-MOBILIZED

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Aug. 30.—A Reuter despatch from Athens says the re-mobilization of the Greek army is under consideration. The entry of Roumania into the war has created a profound impression in Greece and the question of ministerial reorganization providing for the inclusion in the cabinet of former Premier Venizelos has arisen.

ROUMANIANS AND RUSSIANS CAPTURE PASSES.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Aug. 30.—A despatch from Bucharest by wire from Rome says Roumania's operating in conjunction with the Russians have captured the principal passes of the Carpathians in twelve hours, the despatch says, the Roumanians have marched uninterrupted on Hungary territory meeting but weak resistance.

KING CONSTANTINE BEGINNING TO THINK.

(Special to the Guardian.) ATHENS, Aug. 30.—The Marshal of the Greek court today informed the Deputy, that as a result of the Venizelos demonstrating of Sunday King Constantine would appoint a day for receiving a deputation.

AIR RAID ON BUCHAREST.

(Special to the Guardian.) BUCHAREST, Aug. 30.—Bucharest was bombarded by Zeppelins and aeroplanes on Monday night. The statement follows: "During Monday night Zeppelins and foreign aeroplanes threw several bombs on Bucharest without causing the least damage. Artillery drove them off. Enemy aeroplanes threw bombs on Baitliche, Pistrina and Niasitz without doing damage."

Grecian City Was Seized by Bulgarians

(Canadian Press Despatch.) PARIS, Aug. 30.—The city of Drama, in north-eastern Greece, has been seized by Bulgarians, after a battle the captured says that the Bulgarians captured three forts and took prisoner the Greek garrison of 120 men.

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GERMANS MOWED DOWN LIKE CHAFF BY RUSSIANS

Germans Advancing Against Russian Positions Met by Deadly Hail of Bullets and Wall of Bayonets.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, Aug. 30.—Field Marshal Von Hindenburg is preparing for operations on a large scale along the Eastern front, in all or probably at some vulnerable point on the Stokholm line.

MOWED DOWN LIKE CHAFF.

Their impetuous charge was not in any way impeded until the front ranks reached a point about fifty yards from the Russian entanglements. Then from behind the Russian parapets poured a withering fire, mowing down the advancing columns as if they had been chaff.

CANNOT BREAK DEADLOCK.

The Russians are still unable to break the deadlock along the Dnieper Front. With the forces which General Letchitsky has concentrated there north of Mariemopol and at other points in this region, the Russians advanced to the attack but were repulsed, or found it impossible to consolidate their gains before furious Austrian counter-attacks swept them of their feet and back to their original positions.
