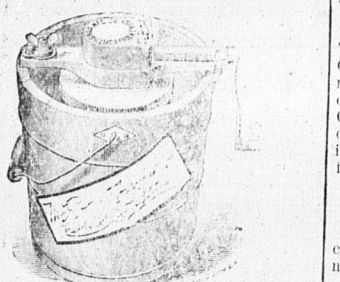

PASTORAL VISITATION.—During the week His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown has been visiting some of the parishes in the eastern part of the province. On Wednesday he visited the Fort Augustus parish for the purpose of giving the rite of Confirmation to a number of young parishioners. Arrived at Mount Ryan he was met by a large number of carriages and escorted to the church at Fort Augustus, where the congregation was assembled. After robing in the parochial house he proceeded to the church under a canopy carried by four of the parishioners and preceded by the candidates for confirmation. After the usual ceremonies His Lordship took his seat inside the rail, when an address of welcome on the part of the congregation was read by Mr. James H. Cumisky, one on behalf of the C. M. B. A. by Mr. John J. McCarthy and one on behalf of the Sacred Heart Society by Mr. Edwin Kelly. His Lordship responded feelingly to the kindly expressions of his people, thanking them for their thoughtfulness and kindness. About seventy children were confirmed after which His Lordship delivered an eloquent address to the parents and children. After the services a reception was held in the vestry, when the parishioners were introduced to His Lordship by the parish priest, Rev. A. J. Macdonald. In the afternoon His Lordship left for Vernon River.

BRITISH CRUISER CAPTURED TWO GERMANS

NEW YORK, July 21.—Two Germans, who were cabin passengers aboard the Dutch steamer Nickerie, were taken off that ship by a boarding party from the British cruiser Iris, which stopped it today off Barnegat, captain Van Borden reported upon his arrival here from South American and West Indian ports to-night. Captain Van Borden reported that after the Nickerie was stopped an officer and a body of marines boarded his ship and ordered everybody upon deck. They picked out Otto Kurz, Weintraub, from Porto Pringe, and took them off, after which the ship was allowed to proceed.

Strategic Conditions Now Favor the Russian Defence

LONDON, July 23.—Referring to the advance of the Teutons on Lublin, the Times Petrograd correspondent says: "Military authorities now affirm that the seizure of the railroad line will not decide the issue, because it runs parallel with the Russian front and does not serve the purposes of transport. Even an advance northward along the line from Cholm as far as Wlodawa would not be regarded as a grave strategic menace, but beyond that point, on the way to Brest Litovsk there is no intention of permitting the foe to proceed. Now for the first time the Russians are able to operate in a region where strategic factors are in their favour."

POURING SAVINGS INTO WAR CHEST

LONDON, July 20.—The Daily Chronicle says this morning: "A German looking on yesterday at the Bank of England might have thought it all a horrid nightmare, for cheques, notes and gold were being shovelled across the counters as fast as the busy clerks could receive them. "It was the first call day of the new war loan. Those who paid five per cent. on application had now to pay an instalment of 10 per cent., of if they preferred, they could now pay women, young and old, were pouring savings into the nations' war chest. Most of the larger sums, were, of course, paid by cheques, but a remarkable amount of gold was also brought to the counters, especially by women, as if cherished hoards never before entrusted to a bank were now being handed over at the call of patriotism. "Even if the sum only paid the 10 per cent. that was necessary, £57,000,000 (\$285,000,000) must have been yesterday added to the war fund, but great numbers of people elected to pay the balance in full and so the actual amount received must have run into a very big figure."
