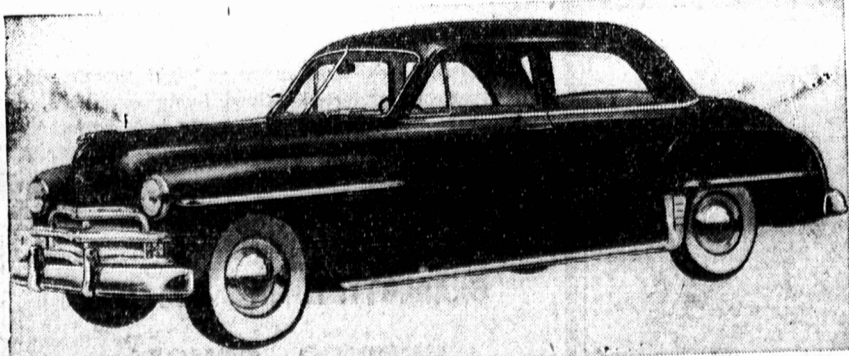

Further evidence of unprecedented business activity on Kent Street, was seen yesterday in the purchase by Messrs. 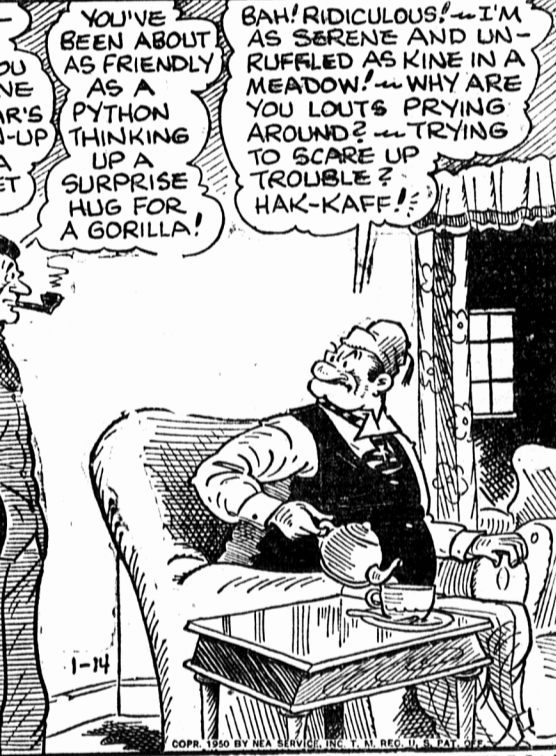

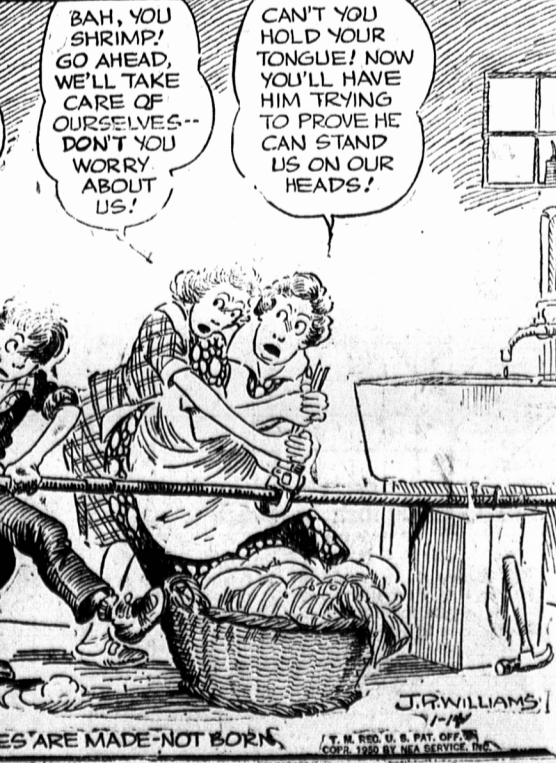
