Annual meeting Of Dental Assn.

Dr. J. E. Corrigan, Charlottetown, was elected president of the Dental Association of Prince Edward Island at the Association's annual meeting on Friday, Aug. 22.

The meeting was held in the I. O. O. F. Hall, Charlottetown. The election of officers for the current year resulted as follows:

President, Dr. J. E. Corrigan, Charlottetown.

Members of the council, Dr. W. G. Hogg, and Dr. F. E. Smallwood, both of Charlottetown.

Dr. D. T. Waye the official delegate to the Canadian Dental Association presented an excellent report on the work of the C. D. A. explaining in detail some of the activities of this body.

Dr. Harry Thomson of Toronto was present and was the chief speaker. Dr. Thomson is field secretary of the Canadian Oral Hygiene Council. He spoke briefly of his organization, explaining the way in which it functioned and of work that it is accomplishing.

He next dealt with the problems facing the Canadian Dental Association and spoke of the need of having a strong national organization capable of dealing with the many problems constantly developing within and without the profession.

The Canadian Dental Association is at present endeavoring to enlarge its field of activities. Dr. Thomson appealed to the Provincial Association to support in every way possible the National Association in order that the profession in Canada may be directed along its proper course and thus not only guide and protect the members of the profession but also to safeguard the best interests of the public in general.

At this meeting it was decided to considerably increase the amount of the annual dues in order that a substantial grant could be made to the Canadian Dental Association.

Nominate Francis Biddle as U. S. Attorney General

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 —(AP)—Francis Biddle, a direct descendant of Edmund Randolph, the first attorney general of the United States, was nominated by President Roosevelt today to be attorney general.

Biddle, solicitor general since January, 1940, will succeed Robert H. Jackson, now a member of the Supreme Court, whom he also succeeded as solicitor general. Charles Fahy, assistant solicitor general, is expected to become Biddle's successor.

Senator Alben Barkley, the majority leader, said it was "a well-earned promotion" and Senator Harry F. Byrd (Dem.-Va.) said he knew of no objections to Biddle.

Senator Robert Taft (Rep.-Ohio) commented "I understand he's an able lawyer and I have no objection to the nomination."

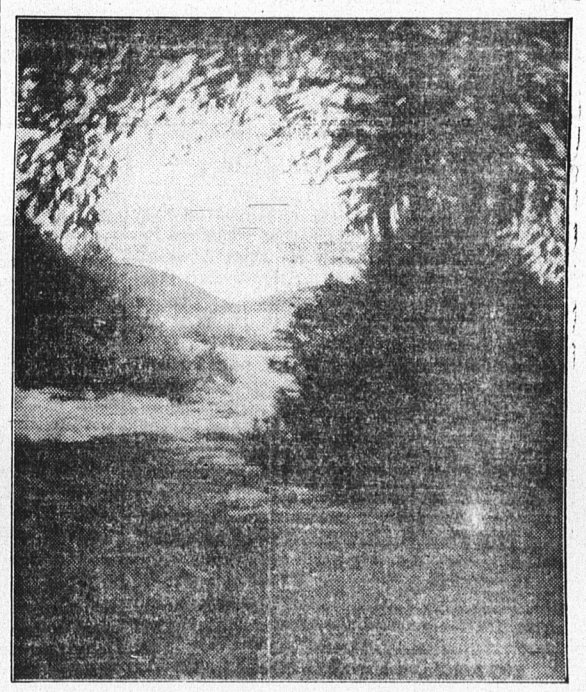

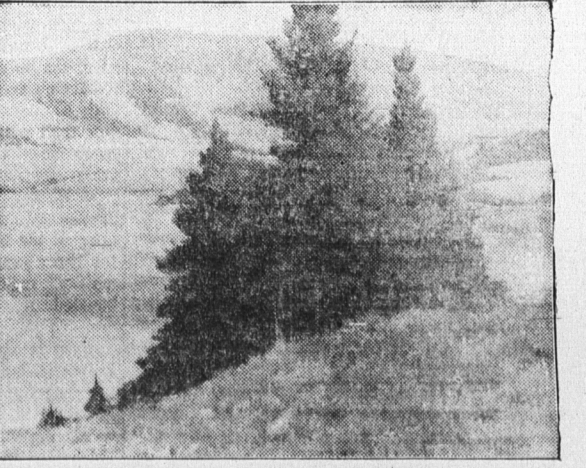
QUEEN'S CANADIAN FUND DONATIONS FOR AIR RAID VICTIMS

Repeated bombing raids on British port areas and the industrial midlands has attracted fresh attention to the frightful suffering of the many thousands of civilians in Great Britain who are harried from shelter to shelter and finally driven into the open country by successive raids. Eventually places are found for them all, places of relative security, but their belongings of all kinds are destroyed. The task of emergency feeding alone is difficult. The task of setting them up once more with some quantity of clothing and bedding is much more difficult. To meet these enormous needs, funds have been started in various parts of the world. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth has permitted the use of her name in connection with the Dominion campaign, which is officially known as "The Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims."
