ST. DUNSTAN'S MOCK PARLIAMENT

The regular session of St. Dunstan's Mock Parliament was held on Wednesday, March 24th, the deputy speaker, Hon. Francis McDonald occupying the chair. After the usual fifteen minutes allotted to questioning the Ministers of the Cabinet, respecting the discharge of their official duties was taken up by the reading of the Bill for the efficient coast defence of Canada was introduced by Hon. S. McDonald, (Winnipeg) and received its second reading.

Whereas the present agitated condition of European affairs appear to place in extreme jeopardy the national safety of this country, and whereas by its present defenceless state it exists as a standing invitation to any military nation desirous of attaining valuable territory.

Therefore resolved that an adequate and efficient system of defence be established in and around the Dominion of Canada, such result to be attained by the adoption of the following measures:

(a) By construction of two powerful fleets of submarine cruisers, modern submergible type and fitted with proper equipment for the discharge of the Whitehead torpedo. One of these fleets to be stationed on the eastern coast of Canada, with base at Sydney, C. B., the other to be stationed on the Pacific coast with base at Nanaimo. Both submarine bases to be protected by land fortifications equipped with the heaviest type of fortress guns. These bases will be garrisoned by a force of 3,000 men, officered by the members of the present Royal Canadian Regiment.

(b) In addition to the fortresses already existing in the Dominion, which shall be improved and modernized. Fortresses shall be established at the following points: Belle Isle, at the entrance of the straits of that name, Cape North, at the Northern extremity of Cape Breton Island; Port Churchill on Hudson Bay.

(c) By the purchase and fortification of Anticosti Island.

(d) By the construction of three al squadrons to be composed of Bleriot monoplanes and Wright biplanes, said squadrons to be used for scouting purposes. One squadron to be situated on the eastern coast with headquarters on Anticosti Island. The second squadron to patrol the United States border in the middle west with base at Winnipeg. The third squadron to patrol along the coast of the Pacific Ocean, with base at Banff, Alberta.

(e) By the establishment of a regular army with a war strength of 300,000 men, to be reduced in time of peace to 1-3 that number. This army to be recruited by volunteer enrollment among the people of Canada, and to be officered for a period of 2 years following the establishment, by men supplied by the Imperial Government. The number and disposition of officers to be modeled on the usage, in European armies and to be fixed by the Militia Dept. The geographical disposition of this army to be fixed upon by the Militia Dept. After a period of 2 years the army shall be officered by men chosen from the ranks, who shall receive, at the expense of the Government, a four years' science course, in any Canadian University, with a one year finishing course in military tactics at the Royal Military College, at Kingston, Ont.

(f) All the military and naval equipment to be of Canadian manufacture, such manufacture being supervised by experts supplied by the British War Office.

Much discussion took place as to when this Bill received its first reading. At the request of the leader of the Opposition, Hon. Henri Crepeau, a communication received from the Secretary of State at Washington, regarding reciprocal trade between Canada and United States, was tabled by the Premier, Hon. D. C. Trainor.

Hon. S. McDonald, (Winnipeg) in an eloquent address demonstrated the efficiency of the Bill for the defence of Canada and explained that in view of the fact that Canada was open to attack at any time to a hostile power, it was absolutely necessary that she be adequately prepared both by land and sea to cope with such an enemy. Hon. J. Fleming spoke at length explaining the inefficiency of the adoption of such a policy as outlined by the Premier. The other speakers on the side of the Government were Hon. W. Monaghan and the Premier, Hon. O. C. Trainor, who vigorously demonstrated the advantages to be derived from the adoption of the Bill for the efficient coast defence of Canada, whilst Hon. Art Daley (Port Arthur), in an eloquent and concise speech explained the defects of the bill, citing figures to show the great expense in maintaining such an army as proposed by the Government.

With this session the St. Dunstan's Mock Parliament closes for the present term, after a very successful sitting which is evidenced by the fact that many members who came into the House for the first time this year, and had never publicly addressed an audience before, could stand up and eloquently express their sentiments without the least sign of embarrassment.

SAYS LOSSES ARE BEING WITHHELD.

LONDON, March 25.—Evidence is accumulating of the heavy British losses in the recent fighting in Flanders. Lord Claud Hamilton, addressing a meeting in London last night, said that the papers were not giving full lists of the losses. His own regiment, the Grenadier Guards, he declared, lost their colonel and sixteen officers, killed and wounded, and of 1,000 men, the finest in the army, only 300 survived.

The Cameronians also seemed to have been almost totally wiped out; their lists of killed and wounded were appalling.
The system of concealment on the part of the military authorities, he asserted, was most ridiculous and he was afraid it would have the effect of prolonging the war.
Owing to the anxiety felt in Scotland regarding the Sixth battalion of Gordon Highlanders, John E. Sutherland regarding the Sixth Battalion of Cameron, whereupon the Under Secretary of the War Department replied that he greatly regretted to state that Colonel Maclean and four other of-

NATIONAL PROHIBITION LOST IN AUSTRALIA.

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, March 21.—National prohibition was defeated in the voting on the liquor to complete returns, which have been announced by the government. Supporters of local no-licence also lost their fight. The vote on both questions, which was close, follows:—
For national prohibition, 247,217; for continuance, 257,442.
For local no-licence, 229,474; for continuance, 274,405.
Since 1911 the percentage of no-licence vote, has fallen from nearly 50 to about 45%.

GERMAN POTATO CROPS DAMAGED.

LONDON, March 25.—Potato crops throughout east and south Germany have been severely damaged by a sudden frost, according to messages from Copenhagen. The present pronounced shortage promises to grow into an absolute famine.
