

Beaverbrook Named Minister Of Production

LONDON, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Lord Beaverbrook, who accompanied Prime Minister Churchill to Washington, became Britain's minister of war production tonight in a new cabinet post made to order for closest co-ordination with the work of Donald M. Nelson, as United States war production chief.

Creation of the new post was foreshadowed by Mr. Churchill in his address in the House of Commons last week when he said that Nelson's appointment in Washington, that "some similar office, not exactly with the same scope but with similar scope, must be created here."

Today's announcement of Lord Beaverbrook's appointment came from 10 Downing Street while Britons, homeward bound from work, read in their newspapers the declaration of N. M. Shvernik, leader of a Russian trade union delegation visiting Britain, that British war factories are falling short of capacity output.

Lord Beaverbrook, who was successful in pushing Britain's aircraft industry on a full war footing, had seemed from the first a likely choice for the appointment. Already minister of supply, he had laid the groundwork for his new job on missions to Washington and Moscow.

The absence of Sir Stafford Cripps from the resulting reassignment occasioned some surprise. There had been indications that Sir Stafford, former British ambassador to Russia, was in line for an important assignment.

Rumors were current in political circles tonight that he had agreed at first to accept the ministry of supply, succeeding Lord Beaverbrook, but withdrew when he learned that Lord Beaverbrook insisted that the new ministry of war production have widespread control over the supply post.

Instead, the ministry of supply went to Sir Andrew Rae Duncan, industrialist, who has been president of the board of trade. He was succeeded as head of the board of trade by Col. J. Llewellyn, 48, who once was Lord Beaverbrook's undersecretary as parliamentary secretary to the ministry of aircraft production.

Sir Andrew, who in the last two decades headed several Canadian Royal commissions who have investigated Nova Scotia problems, returns to a post he previously held. He will not be a member of the war cabinet.

Missing Airman Is war prisoner

OTTAWA, Feb. 4.—(CP)—The Royal Canadian Air Force reported today in an official casualty list that one man previously reported missing overseas now is a prisoner of war and that four men previously reported missing in Canada now are reported safe.

In its 17th list of the war, the air force also reported one man dangerously ill, one seriously injured in an automobile accident and two seriously ill, all in Canada.

The four airmen now reported safe in Canada were listed as missing after an operational flight in the R.C.A.F.'s 17th casualty list last Thursday night, by an air force statement, the same night reported they had been found in Newfoundland.

They had made a forced landing and took four days to get the 20 miles to the nearest town.

The overseas airman now reported a prisoner of war—Pilot Officer George E. McGill, of Toronto—was a member of the crew of a big Wellington bomber which took part in a raid on the German naval base at Wilhelmshaven some weeks ago.

McGill and three other members of the crew were ordered to bail out when the bomber took fire. The pilot of the ship, Sgt. Pilot L. C. Bray of Toronto and Bronte, Ont., guided it safely back to base after another member of the crew had managed to control the flames.

Wild Rose hips In Fruit juice

LONDON, Feb. 4.—(CP)—Even Britain's wild roses have been called on to do their part for the nation.

Countywomen, boy scouts, girl guides and school children last fall searched Britain's hedgerows and commons for the annual crop of "hips"—bright red fruit of the wild rose. Processed by manufacturers, 500 tons of this fruit has become a syrup 20 times richer in vitamin "C" than orange juice which now is scarce.

This quantity will meet the requirements of 2,500,000 babies for a year allowing 15 drops a day for each child for one month.

DiMaggio receives '42 Yankee contract

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—(AP)—Joe DiMaggio received his 1942 contract from New York Yankees in today's mail and this year's biggest baseball salary struggle immediately swung into motion.

The Yankees' payroll is a secret, but club writers believe the club had offered its centerfielder close to \$40,000 for the coming season, an increase of about \$4,000 over the sum he was thought to have received in 1941.

"This is just the start of negotiations," said DiMaggio, and added that he and his wife and baby are not going to let the salary discussion hold up their Florida vacation. They will leave tomorrow or Friday for St. Petersburg and wait for the Yankees to open their training camp there the last of this month.

He has been a persistent hold-out in previous years, usually waiting until training has started before signing, and in 1938 did not come to an agreement until the season was a week old.

Then the club made him get in condition at his own expense and did not start his pay until he made his debut April 30.

However, this money, amounting to about \$150,000, was paid up to him in his contract the following year.

Axis Sub stalks American Freighter

LEWES, Del., Feb. 4.—(AP)—Beneath a bright moon an axis submarine crept upon the 3598-ton freighter San Gil off the Maryland coast last midnight, sent a torpedo crashing into her port side, then sank her with another torpedo and shells after lifeboats had been lowered.

Captain Walter W. Koch said two members of the crew were killed in an explosion that "blew the engine room to bits." Koch, the 39 other members of his crew and the ship's only passenger, Stewart Winslow Condon, 26, of Rosindale, Mass., were landed here today by coast guardsmen.

Four of the crew received minor injuries. The freighter was the 14th American or allied vessel officially reported sunk off the Atlantic coast by marauding U-boats since the United States entered the war. A 15th vessel, the tanker Malay, was attacked but was not sunk.

Danger signals flashed from an emergency room set up by radio operator Robert S. Thorp, after his regular equipment was wrecked, brought aid to the survivors seven hours after they took to lifeboats. Captain Koch said.
