Gunder Haegg Says Going After Some World Records

B. ORLO ROBERTSON (Associated Press Writer) NEW YORK, June 21 — (AP) — Now that he has shown American crack fans that he can really run, Gunder Haegg is going to make a serious assault on at least three of the seven world records he hung up last summer in Sweden.

He wants to go after his two mile international standard of 8:47 at Chicago, July 2, and again at Los Angeles on July 10. His 2,000-metre record of 8:01.2 will be his objective at San Francisco, July 17. At Boston, July 24, he'll again run two miles and a week later, July 31, at Cleveland he'll attempt to lower his 2,000-metre mark of 5:11.8.

The moderns would line up thus: Goal, Dave Kerr; defence, Earl Siebert and Art Coulter; centre, Syl Apps, and wings, Brian Hexall and Dave Schirmer.

And on the Boston "all-star" Bobby would have Frankie Brimsek in goal with Tiny Thompson as an alternate; Eddie Shore and Lionel Hitchman on defence; Milt Schmidt at centre with Bill Cowley as an alternate and Porky Dumart on left wing, with Dit Clapper on right.
