for this Committee, not being warranted by Mr. Reardon as promised.
Not from any point of view can we see fair play or even common sense in this purchase, which is far from fair to our workmen and taxpayers.
We are, and have been, for many years paying from \$100 to \$150 into the City Treasury in taxes on our small business. The LaFrance Company has never paid taxes here. Still they seem to have the preference, not because the machine is better—because we know it is not—but because they have had the chance to have their high pressure salesman make his arguments before the Committee without opposition from any competitor, even going so far as to convince this Committee that they are buying as good a machine, though paying duty of \$3600.
At this time when the American Congress and Senate have raised the tariff wall chiefly against Canadian interests—as high as the Walls of China—it behooves Canadians to patronize home industry and keep the money at home where it is so much needed and where it rightfully belongs. Under present conditions we do not believe that any Government would grant permission to the City of Charlottetown to send \$15,500 to an American concern employing American labor.
We ourselves do not propose to stand for it without a protest so strong that it will have an echo in the minds of the working man and the business man of Charlottetown, and we hope too, the working man and business man in other parts of Canada. We promise you fully, that we will not leave this subject until it is thoroughly aired, from one end of Canada to the other, unless this shameful transaction is cancelled.

Commends Idea Of Bird Sanctuary In This Province

Among the visitors to the city yesterday, was Mr. Walter Havelock Robb of Abbey Dawn, Ontario, poet of Canadian birdland.
A few miles out of Kingston, Ontario, Mr. Robb has a bird sanctuary of five hundred acres, and he is devoting all his time to spreading abroad a knowledge of Canadian birds.
The beautiful bird pictures which are being distributed through the Royal Ontario Museum of Zoology, Toronto, all originate in Abbey Dawn where the artists find their subjects.
"My object in coming to Prince Edward Island," Mr. Robb stated, "is to make a plea for interest in the birds of Canada in the name of the Prince of Wales, who is my patron, so that Boy Scouts, Girl Guides and nature lovers in general will have somewhere to turn to get pictures and knowledge of birds, more than they have done. At Abbey Dawn we have almost all the kinds of birds that come into Canada. There are birds there winter and summer.
"The birds come to Abbey Dawn and they know me and answer my call. I can go out in the woods and take strangers, give the call, and the birds will come right on my hand. I mention this in order to get people to do the same thing. There is no magic about it, no tricks of the trade, anybody can do it.
"Mr. Robb is visiting different provinces of Canada in order to get the people interested in the work which he himself has so much at heart.
"Questioned as to his opinion of the probable success of a bird sanctuary in the Province, Mr. Robb heartily commended the idea.
"He stressed the point that bird sanctuaries are a great attraction to American tourists.

CONSTRUCTION OF TELEPHONE BUILDING COMPLETED—The construction of the building, designed for the new headquarters of the P. E. Island Telephone System, on the corner of Queen and Fitzroy Streets, is now completed as planned, and is ready for the installation of the equipment. The equipment, however, has been delayed, and it is expected that the transfer from the building on Queen Street will not be completed before the first of next year. The building is a two-storied structure, 84 feet long by 41 feet wide, built of fireproof brick with stone trimmings and thoroughly modern fireproof floors throughout. The public entrance will be on Queen Street and the employees' entrance on Fitzroy Street. The front section of the lower floor containing the large commercial office, the rear half will contain the power apparatus, the charging machine and the terminal room. This room will house the charging machine, the ringing machine, special testing equipment, main distributing frame and relay racks. In the rear also is the public space, the managers office and the quarters of the commercial staff. The section facing Fitzroy St. on the second floor is to be used as operating room. On the same floor is located the operators' rest and locker rooms, and two other rooms, one of which will be used as an emergency rest room, the other for the making of service tests. Provision has been made for the building of a third floor when required. In the basement the heating plant is located. The apparatus is bricked off. The equipment consists of an oil furnace with an outside tank. In the rear half of the basement is a tiled battery room, which will contain the

storage batteries. In the northwestern corner is located a concrete cable vault, from which will be distributed all underground cables which enter the building.

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 15.—The cheese market improved here today with Quebec cheese the heaviest seller quoted at 14 1-4 to 14 3-8 cents a pound and Ontario cheese at 15 1-4 to 15 3-8 cents a pound. The butter market was unchanged with trading quiet. Prices quoted were No. 1 pasteurized butter in cartons, 29 cents a pound to retailers. Solids were 32 to 33 cents a pound and prints 33 to 34 cents. A firmer feeling was displayed in the carlot egg market today extras were quoted at 43 to 44 cents a dozen, firsts at 36 to 37 cents and seconds at 26 1/2 to 28 cents. There was no change in the potato market. Prices quoted here for New Brunswick green mountains extrack per 80 pound bags, were \$1.05 and 95 cents to \$1.00 for N.B. cobbiers.
