South African Labor Shortage

PRETORIA, South Africa, Oct. 18 —(CP) — A manpower shortage like none preceding it has hit South Africa where rapidly growing industries and businesses continue to rob most other spheres of their already meagre supplies of workers. Official figures show that during the past eight years the number of employees in industry in the Union increased by 150,000 and their salaries by more than \$48,000,000 (\$172,000,000). In the same period the value of the output of industry increased from £150,500,000 to £330,500,000. The Union's civil service provided a good example of the drift to industry despite increased salaries for civil servants. In the public service alone five employees have been leaving daily for the last nine months for work that is better paid. It is partly because of this shortage of European manpower in the country—and partly to increase the electorate — that Prime Minister Smuts, recently announced that South Africa's doors are to be opened wide to immigrants. But the far graver problem is the shortage of unskilled African labor on whom the country largely depends. The vast majority of unskilled laborers in South Africa are the Africans of the country and many thousands drawn from surrounding territories. Most of these Africans live under the tribal system in agricultural areas and come to work in the towns for periods generally less than a year. Long-Standing Shortage The gold mines, among the biggest employers of African labor, have been short of men since 1930. To recruit labor for the gold mines is the full-time activity of two organizations employing between them 500 Europeans and thousands of Africans, who go far into the uncivilized areas of Africa to induce Africans of the hinterland to sign work contracts. Housing conditions for Africans in towns are extremely unattractive and medical and recreational services are meagre, so that the health

3 Explosions Shake Gov't Buildings

STUTTGART, Germany, Oct. 20 —(AP)—Three bombs exploded last night against government buildings in the Stuttgart area in what United States army investigators called an apparent protest of further proceedings against Hjalmer Schacht, German financier acquitted at Nuernberg. One bomb exploded against the American military jail, apparently in the belief that Schacht was there. Actually he was in a German jail some distance away awaiting a hearing before a German denazification board. The first bomb exploded on the window sill of the records office of the German denazification board at Backnang, 15 miles northeast of here, where the Germans arrested Schacht. Another exploded on the window sill of a similar office in Stuttgart. No one was injured, although 10 American military police at the jail were shaken up. The Wuerttemberg-Baden district headquarters of the regional military government said records were not destroyed. Lt.-Gen. Lucius D. Clay, deputy American military governor, said in Berlin he believed the bombings were done by Nazis who hoped to destroy records in a German denazification court because they feared trial. An army investigator on the spot said "no assumption is that somebody is trying to register a protest against denazification proceedings against Schacht after he was acquitted at Nuernberg." The investigator said German police were leaning to the same theory and that investigators were inclined to discount the first belief that an attempt was made to kill or release Schacht.
