# LOCAL BRIEFS

## The Latest News of the City and Province.

Gathered By Guardian Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

REV. G. P. RAYMOND will preach to-night at the evangelistic service in the Baptist Church.

THE Stanley left Pictou yesterday morning, but up to a late hour last night she had not reached Georgetown.

"Oh, my little yaller con good-night," one of the popular songs of the day—in St. Peter's school-room on Monday, Feb. 13th.

THIS evening the public will have the opportunity of witnessing one of the most interesting hockey matches of the season and the best race.

MR. WALLACE McLEOD, one of the forwards in the Abegweits' hockey club, had his nose broken by a blow from the puck, while practicing in the rink Wednesday night.

THE officials for the races to-night are: A. E. Ings, referee and starter; J. M. Campbell and Dr. H. D. Johnson, judges; Howard Dingwell, timer; Lorne Unsworth and Thos. Howatt, handicappers.

THE next Literary Meeting of the Epworth League of the First Methodist church will be held next Tuesday evening when Miss Lucy Lafursey will speak on "The Women of Shakespeare." Remember the date.

MR. FRED BEER left yesterday evening for Georgetown, en route to the Pacific coast, where a good position awaits his arrival. Mr. Beer returned from British Columbia in the spring to recuperate from an attack of fever. During the summer he was superintendent of a number of workmen engaged in sewerage construction in this city. Mr. Beer will remain in Toronto for a few days.

MUCH interest is centered in the hockey match, which takes place in St. Dunstan's rink on Tuesday evening next, between the 2nd Victorias, Charlottetown, and the Crescents of Crapaud. The Crescents won a game from a picked team from the junior clubs of Summerside and subsequently defeated the Crescents of this city, in their own rink. Next they will try the above team and a hot time may be expected.

THE funeral of the late Dr. Leeming took place yesterday afternoon, and was under Masonic auspices. The brethren turned out well, and there was also a large attendance of citizens generally. The services at the church and at the grave were taken by Rev. J. T. Bryan, rector of St. Paul's. The body was interred in the people's Cemetery. The honorary pall-bearers were Charles Palmer, H. J. Cundall, W. H. Aitken, J. D. Seaman, Adam Murray and Benj Rogers. The active pall bearers were chosen from the brethren of St. John's Lodge, of which the deceased had been chaplain for many years.

PRESENTATION AT NORTH RIVER.—Upon returning from the prayer meeting on Wednesday evening, the Rev. A. F. Browne, of North River, found the Parsonage in the possession of a large number of friends who had come with ample provision for a bountiful supper and a good time generally, and also, as soon appeared for a more important purpose. Shortly after eight o'clock, the meeting was called to order by Mr. Rouben Barrett, of Kingston; Mr. William Fraser, of Linwood, was made chairman. After a few pleasant remarks he called upon William Scott, Esq., of Clyde River, who, in an extremely witty and eloquent speech stated the real object of the gathering. According to Mr. Scott: Mr. Browne is a worthy successor of John the Baptist, as we read in the Scriptures, that individual wore a coat of camel's hair. On P. E. Island such a coat could not be procured, but there are other animals whose hair is especially fitted for garments, and as a token of their respect for their Pastor in his work, and their desire for his comfort, while taking the long drives necessary in his large field, they had come to provide him with the best known protection against cold and storm. At this point Mr. Benjamin Wad, of Kingston, stepped forward and enveloped Mr. Browne in an elegant fur coat, a present from his congregations in Kingston and Clyde River. His old patients at Kensington will no doubt however be pleased to have him near them again. Mrs. McNeill will leave next week for Alberta, N. W. T. where she will spend the winter for the benefit of her health.

THE summer residence of Judge Fitzgerald, at Holland Cove, about half a mile from Rockey Point, was burned to the ground yesterday afternoon, says the Patriot. Mr. McLean, son of the keeper of the block house, noticing the smoke hastened to the place, reaching there just in time to see the roof fall in. The origin of the fire is not known. The house has been unoccupied since the Judge and his family moved into the city last fall. The boats and the contents of the house were destroyed, a clean sweep having been made by the flames. The insurance carried was \$200. The total loss will be between \$500 and \$600.

KENSINGTON mourns the loss of one of its best beloved and most respected citizens. Mrs. Charles A. McNutt died on Monday morning the 30th ult. She was born at Park Corner, New London being the second daughter of the late William Cousins Esq. She lived in Kensington for the last 17 years and endeared herself to many by her quiet, kindly and unassuming manner. Her deeds of charity were many and the poor will certainly miss her. For many years she had been almost confined to the house by serious illness which she bore with calm resignation to the Divine will. Her funeral, which was largely attended by prominent persons from Summerside, Malpeque and New London took place on Wednesday the 1st inst. The service was conducted by Rev. Charles McKay, assisted by Rev. F. A. Wightman of Margate. She was buried in Malpeque cemetery. 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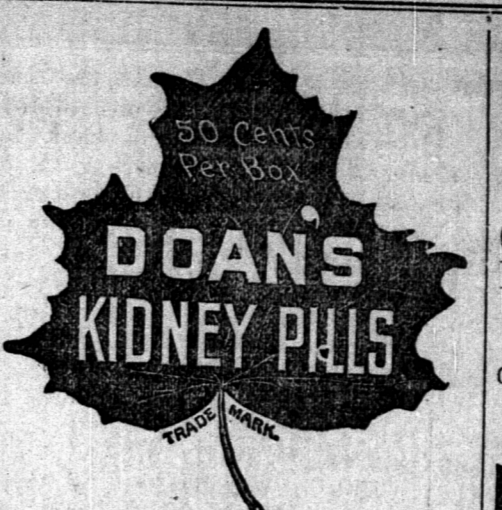
