PRICES SAG IN WINNIPEG IN NEW YORK GRAIN MARKET EXCHANGE

(By John L. Cooley, Associated Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, Sept. 14—After extracting further nourishment from inflation gossip and credit expansion possibilities today, stock and commodity markets backed down from their early highs today and closing prices represented generally small net changes.

La's Reaction Minimum levels, in force on the exchange since Aug. 16 were re-scinded by a meeting of the membership of the grain exchange shortly after the opening. Prices immediately sagged, but under the influence of buying for export, which near the close was estimated at more than 1,000,000 bushels, values reacted and held around yesterday's final figures for most of the early trade.

Inflationary Forecast Senator Harrison's forecast of an inflationary move of some sort and his intimation that it might take the form of dollar devaluation fitted nicely with the tenor of gossip recently heard in Wall Street, where speculative pulses have been quickened by the possibility that something might be done to aid prices.

Trading Active Trading was fairly active all morning and pit volume was the greatest it has been for some time. Export buying formed the bulk of support in the early session. Late in the day no figure had been placed on sales of Canadian wheat but it was reported a good business was worked.

Outside markets lent strength to local prices in early operations but Liverpool, after opening strong, eased off near the close to finish Canadian dollar in New York 95 18-16. IN MEMORIAM

MR. JOHN J. POWER

A well known and respected Prince Edward Islander passed to his reward in the death of John J. Power, for several years past a resident of Oakland, Calif., Maple Leaf. Mr. Power had been in poor health for some time but continued in active business up to recently. He was a native of Souris, where he left for the United States when a young man. He had lived in the West many years, in Seattle, San Diego and of late in Oakland. He was a contractor and builder, an excellent workman, and was noted for his ability to construct beautiful altars.

His death occurred on August 18. The funeral was held on the 20th from the funeral parlors of Freeman & Cox-Roach & Keney Co., Twenty-seventh street and Telegraph avenue, to Sacred Heart Church, where a requiem high Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul. Interment was in St. Mary's cemetery. The church was filled with friends of the deceased, among them being a large number from the Maritime Provinces. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus and the Catholic Order of Foresters.

CANADA GIVES ORDERS

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana, Sept. 13—New hope for the languishing coconut industry of British Guiana has arisen with receipt of large orders from Canada. Hon. E. M. Valcott, prominent businessman and owner of the largest coconut estate here, announced today he already had started a shipment of 50,000 selected coconuts to Canada. The price, he said, was distinctly favorable to the industry and permitted local manufacture of edible oil which has been diminishing yearly with coconut exports.
